# Burton in Lonsdale Annual Parish Meeting Held on Thursday 11 May 2023 at 7.30pm At the Village Hall, High Street, Burton in Lonsdale

#### 1. Welcome, Introduction and Apologies

#### 1.1. Welcome

The Chairman welcomed everyone to Burton in Lonsdale's Annual Parish Meeting and thanked them for coming. He explained that this not a Parish Council meeting. It is a meeting of the whole parish to 'discuss parish affairs'. He stated that any issues can be reported to the Parish Council by email, phone or in person at scheduled parish council meetings.

Where there is a Parish Council, as is the case in Burton in Lonsdale, the Parish Council normally organises the Annual Parish Meeting.

Parish Meetings are open to all registered voters in the parish and any 6 voters can call a Parish Meeting. Parish meetings can also demand a Parish Poll on a specific issue.

#### 1.2. Introductions

The Chair introduced:-

The Parish Clerk - Sally Preece

The Parish Councillors – Mike Biles, Alan Coulthurst, Rebecca Spedding, Billie Strickland (vice chair), David Taylor and Ian Wardle

The Chair explained that the meeting will largely follow the published agenda with the focus of the meeting being to hear from the organisations who make our village what it is.

The Chair asked for the meeting's agreement to swap the order of agenda items 3 and 4

He mentioned a few housekeeping items:

- The meeting is being recorded by the Parish Clerk;
- Any registered voter is entitled to speak at the Parish Meeting;
- If you wish to speak, please can you raise your hand
- Councillor Biles expressed concerns that the chair of the parish council had suggested that village organisations should aim to make their statements no greater than 250 words. Councillor Biles made the point that the Chair of the Parish Council does not have the authority to dictate the number of words that a contributor may choose to make in a Parish Meeting. The Chair responded by saying it was not the intention to limit the length of statements, the aim was to offer guidance in a similar way to that offered by a neighbouring Town Council. Whilst no contributors had expressed concern at this guidance the chair offered his apologies to anyone who was offended by his suggestion.

#### 1.3. Apologies

The Clerk read out apologies received before the meeting.

#### 2. Minutes of the Parish Meeting of 26 May 2022

The Chairman proposed that the minutes of the last parish meeting, which lasted 90 minutes, were accepted. This was seconded by Councillor Wardle and passed.

#### 3. What does the Parish Council do?

Burton in Lonsdale is typical of a small Parish Council. Responsibilities include:

- Maintenance and management of recreation fields, the pavilion, benches, village green, war memorial and common land, also;
- Maintenance of the old, closed church yard and;
- Street lighting to most of the village, with the exception of Greeta Heath, Brookland and Manor Close.

The Parish Council also aims to represent the views of the village in issues that may impact residents including planning consultations, highway safety and policing and security. Where the Parish Council is not directly responsible, it will work with other authorities to support the interests of the village.

The Parish Council meets 10 times a year. Residents of the village are invited to attend these meetings. Your input is much appreciated. Residents who can't attend but wish to raise an issue, may contact the Parish Clerk, details on the village website.

The Parish Council budget comes predominantly from payment by village residents through the precept which is collected alongside council tax. The precept increased this year for the first time in 3 years to cover inflation, additional administration and the ongoing project to eradicate Japanese Knotweed from the riverbank. The increase was 7.7%. A Council tax Band D precept is about £72 for this year.

The Parish Council maintains an email circulation list, used to share details of meetings, events and items of news. Parishioners are invited to ask the Parish Clerk to add their names to this list.

Details of PC activities are included within the Burton in Lonsdale website.

A final note: A number of you may have received an email from an organisation called Parish.com. At first sight it appears to be a government sponsored initiative to link businesses with parish council needs for a fee. It is an impressive website which has been developed by skilled IT experts. It isn't government backed and it is not supported by Burton in Lonsdale Parish Council.

#### 4. Chairman of the Parish Council's Report

a) The current Parish Council was formed following the local elections in May last year. The majority of members had no experience of being councillors, so it has been a steep learning curve. The year also started without the support of a Parish Clerk. The PC was delighted to welcome Sally Preece as Parish Clerk last July.

In what has been the first year of this council, a priority has been to listen to residents to understand what is of most importance within the village. Several messages have been particularly strong including:

- Influencing the planning process.
- Getting best use out of the pavilion and playing fields.
- Improving road safety.
- Supporting the proposed upgrading of the village hall.

The Parish Council is working on all four of these areas. Details can be found in the minutes of PC meetings. Given the level of interest in planning and the recreation fields I have asked colleagues to provide reports on these two areas.

The Parish Council will continue to listen to residents of Burton in Lonsdale and to work with businesses and voluntary organisations in the interest of the community. Please get involved.

The past year has seen a huge amount of involvement by so many members of the community. The jubilee and coronation celebrations are examples of village-wide achievements. Working on road safety and planning issues are at times complicated. The support provided by members of the community has been of great assistance.

Billie Strickland leads the Parish Council planning committee. I have asked her to report on progress over the past year:

#### b) Parish Council Planning Report

Councillor Strickland reported on the activities of the planning committee. The aim of the committee is to listen to the views of villagers in order to develop responses to planning applications. The committee has worked closely with the planning and enforcement officers at Craven District Council and it is hoped that that can continue with the new Yorkshire County Council planning department. Councillor Strickland thanked everyone for participating in the extraordinary meeting to discuss the application for lodges at the west end of the village, which helped to inform the Parish Council's response to the application.

#### c) Parish Council Recreation Fields Report

The Recreation fields continue to be used by the Lonsdale Terriers football team. The Parish Council is committed to increasing the use of the pitch by other local organisations. The Pavilion is used on a regular basis by several organisations and is becoming a popular venue for family parties. The aim for the coming year is to attract more users by improving the quality of advertising and increasing awareness throughout the local area.

The use of the pitches for the Jubilee Sports Day and the Coronation Celebrations has demonstrated the potential of the site.

Thank you all in advance for your continued support of the Parish Council.

#### 6. County Councillor's Report

David Ireton has offered his apologies and asked for the following report to be tabled:

#### Briefing note:

The new North Yorkshire Council launched on April 1. It represents the biggest shake-up in local government in the county since 1974.

The new authority will bring together the current eight councils which provide services to the public to form one single organisation covering the whole of England's largest county.

You will still be able to access all the support, advice and services you do currently but from just one council instead of eight.

Access to support and services will be easier, via one telephone number, one website, one customer service team and one set of face-to-face customer access points spread across the whole county.

There will be a main office in each former district area, supported by around 30 additional customer access points located in public locations.

Having one council will end confusion over which council does what and which councillor is responsible for which area.

More than 80 per cent of our staff live in North Yorkshire and take pride in delivering good quality services for their families, friends and the communities they serve.

The new council was launched on April 1 when North Yorkshire County Council and the existing seven district and borough authorities merged to pave the way for a long-awaited devolution deal. Devolution is a key policy of the Government, handing over decision-making powers to local political leaders and providing millions of pounds in funding to shape major policies and projects on a regional level.

There is a proposed 30-year devolution deal for York and North Yorkshire, with an investment fund of £540 million which was unveiled on August 1 last year and is due to lead to benefits ranging from new and betterpaid jobs and improved skills and training to more affordable housing.

Replacing eight councils with one authority gives us all the best possible chance of protecting the services which residents value at a time of exceptional financial pressures on public services.

It is estimated that there will be a shortfall of more than £30 million in the new council's revenue budget for the next financial year, all of which will have to be covered by the one-off use of reserves after some additional savings have also been introduced.

However, North Yorkshire Council will be large enough to maximise the benefits of delivering services at scale across a rural county but is being designed with communities at its heart. Even in its first few years, by joining up services and maximising spending power North Yorkshire Council will save between £30 million and £70 million, which will then become annual savings.

This is money that can be used to help protect some of the most important local services at a critical time when everyone and every organisation is feeling the pressure from increased costs.

There will be tough financial decisions ahead, but by making this change now, we are in a much stronger position to manage the rising costs and increased demand for services.

We are also in a stronger position to work with partners like the health sector, police, fire, and the community and voluntary sector to get the most from every pound of taxpayers' money in North Yorkshire.

North Yorkshire Council will have overall spending power of about £1.4 billion, including £343 million on schools.

North Yorkshire Council is dedicated to community awards which covers the whole of the County recognise and honour those volunteers who selflessly dedicate their time to improving lives of others. These awards acknowledge the efforts of both organisations and individual volunteers the categories are; 1 best community Group; 2 volunteer of the year; 3 to shine a light on the inspirational work that is happening to tackle climate change on a local level.

#### **District Councillor Stuart Handley**

Craven District Council ceased to exist at the end of March. Stuart Handley is unable to attend tonight's meeting but has asked that I offer his apologies and on his behalf to confirm that the handover from Craven to NYCC has been successfully completed and to say it was a pleasure to represent Burton in Lonsdale for 4 years.

#### 7. Village Organisations' reports

Representatives of village organisations were invited, largely in alphabetical order, to present a report of their group's activities and plans:-

**B4RN4BIL** - report submitted before the meeting by Simon Sockton was read by Cllr Thompson

The B4RN4BiL project had a very busy year! It will not have escaped your attention that B4RN contractors as well as the B4RN4BiL Community Workforce were busy installing the B4RN network in the village during the second half of 2022. With over 125 properties now connected and enjoying the world's fastest broadband the project has been extremely successful. There are a few loose ends to tie up; the connection to Mount Wellington should be underway shortly, a small amount of rework is required to connect the Village shop, Multimedia shop and adjoining properties, and a route to a property on the outskirts of the village and to Waterside Potteries both need establishing.

A big thank you to the community for being so patient whilst the work was completed. A B4RN connection has been provisioned for every property in the village. So if you want B4RN now or in the future please don't hesitate to request B4RN by searching 'GetB4RN' online.

As a result of the efforts of the B4RN4BiL Community Workforce, £15,000 has been raised (held by BRG) which members would like to spend on community projects. We would like the funds to stretch as far as possible and benefit as many people as possible. Therefore, we are looking to support as many projects as we can and ideally those that are already part funded. Funding is one aspect of a project, but when coupled with the Community Workforce's efforts we have the potential to make a real impact in our community.

Burton Bowling Club continues to thrive with a membership of over 30. On behalf of the club I would like to thank all who help with the running of the club. The club officials are: Chairman: Brian Ramwell, Treasurer; Tony Blacow, Secretary: Steve Vose, President and Safety Officer: John Wood. Committee: Doreen Dryden, Shaun Wilson, Chris and Val Thompson, Lee Marshall, Malcolm Bibby. The green is mowed and maintained by Shaun Wilson, Tony Blacow and John Mason.

Future projects involve: repairing, replacing the clubhouse roof after the storms last winter, building a new thief proof tool shed and erecting a marking hut at the far end of the green.

We field a team in the South Westmoreland Seniors Bowling League, Captained by John Mason, these matches are played on Monday afternoons throughout the season against teams such as Bowness, Burneside, Heversham, etc.

We also field a team in the Kendal Bowling League, captained by Shaun Wilson, (We came top in division 4 last season so go up to the third division this year, well done!) There matches are played on Tuesday evenings, against teams such as Heversham, Allithwaite, Staveley, etc.

Friendly matches are organised by Jane Burns and Captained by Doreen Dryden, and are played on Saturday afternoons, these matches are played against Ingleton, Bentham, Hornby, Kirkby Lonsdale and Austwick. Thanks go to the ladies of the club who make the teas and organise the raffles.

The bowling Club are hosts this year for the annual Home Guard Cup which has been played between Bentham, Austwich, Ingleton and ourselves. There is a story that this competition was originally a rifle shooting contest but was eventually replaced with a bowling competition.

Burton Bowling Club is an excellent ambassador for the village hosting many matches and events from visiting teams from all the towns and villages mentioned above.

We raise funds by means of annual subscriptions and an annual jumble sale held at Ingleton Community Centre in the Spring.

We are always looking to attract new members to join us and enjoy the company and friendship that bowling provides. Bowling is a community activity and any age group can play and compete, we have players in their twenties and two member in their nineties. We hold practice sessions on Thursday evenings at 6.30 and also practice on Wednesday and Friday afternoons at 2pm.

Visitors to the village are welcome to play throughout the season, entrance fee £1 per person.

Would it be possible to fix a sensor light or a solar sensor light or a delayed action switch for the outside light which is there but the switch is taped over. <u>Burton Regeneration Group</u> - report submitted before the meeting by Ian Thompson read by Cllr Thompson Since completing the sports pavilion project, Burton Regeneration Group has restricted its activities to supporting projects initiated by other groups in the village. It has done this by providing funding to Burton Pals with Trowels and through the Parish Council for the improvement of the Multi-Use Games Area.

When the B4RN4BiL project was set up, BRG offered its support as a registered charity with an established bank account and annual accounting process. This enabled B4RN4BiL to concentrate on the practical aspects of their project while BRG looked after the administration of claiming grants for the work done by community volunteers.

The funds raised by the Community Workforce in the B4RN4BiL project are currently held in the BRG bank account and are being used to deliver projects for the village.

First Responders are now fully active in the village with the health protocols introduced during Covid largely lifted. We have recommenced face to face training and are also required to undertake greater online mandatory training.

I am pleased to say the village responders are to be joined by another volunteer Colin Stroud shortly. As ever we would be delighted if anyone else would like to undertake training to be a first responder.

#### **Concert and Cakes** - Report presented by Christine Wardle

This year, in September, Concert&Cakes will be 10 years old!

The first concert was held in September 2013 and was a tribute to Burton in Lonsdale resident Chris Rowland. An internationally renowned violinist and chamber musician, Chris established the Chamber Music Department at the Royal Northern College of Music and it is the heritage of those groups he coached that we enjoy today at All Saints Church.

The structure of offering free concerts in return for donations is based on a similar successful concert series at Emmanuel Church in Manchester and we are committed to making sure that ours are accessible and open to as many people as possible.

Concert&Cakes is run by myself organising the music and the publicity, Steve Vose managing the finances and Cathy Rowland organising the cakes. In the last year, we returned to our usual pattern of four concerts, in October, November, February and March. After a break of 2 years during the Covid-19 pandemic, October and November had a smaller audience than we used to have, but February and March seemed to be back to strength with between 100 and 120 at each.

And now for some statistics. In the last ten years we have

- Held 35 concerts
- Hosted 136 musicians
- Playing around 23 different instruments
- Enjoyed an estimated 490 cakes!!

We have 90 names on our email list and estimate the cumulative audience over the last 10 years to be around 3,500 (some people coming more than once of course!)

And as for the musicians, well

Caroline Pether from the first ensemble we had, the Zelkova String Quartet, is now leader of Manchester Camerata

Dani Sicari and the Easy Rollers, who entertained us at the Village Jubilee party last year have just completed a Spring tour

Delia Stevens of Kabantu is now senior lecturer in percussion at Leeds conservatoire alongside a string of performing credits and broadcasting and

Abel Selaocoe of Project Jam Sandwich has been signed as a solo artist on Warner Classics, released his first album last September, featured on Later ... with Jools Holland and has just returned from his first US tour. I'd like to finish with a message from Cathy, which was originally intended to be published in The Burtonian:

"Christine, Steve and myself never cease to be amazed at the number of people who come up to us and tell us how much they enjoy the event, which is a joy for us to hear and makes all the preparatory work worthwhile, even though it is the musicians, bakers and helpers who graciously bring it all to life on the day! Way back in 2012 the event was conceived first and foremost as an inclusive, community event and this magical 'musical tea party' does only happen because of each of you who contribute to it. So, an enormous thank you to all of you who have helped make it happen for a staggering 10 years!!! Wonderfully my current list of bakers (who must groan every time they get my 'cake begging letters') actually contains some of the same names as 10 years ago! Whilst not everyone can bake every time (although some faithfully do!) the sheer number of cakes baked by certain villagers for Concert&Cakes down the years will, by now, be very high.

So this is just to salute and thank each one of you bakers and helpers. Concert&Cakes would not have been what it has been - and still is -without each one of your contributions! THANK YOU!

#### Report on the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations for the Annual Parish meeting

In January 2022 the Parish Council appointed a sub-committee to organise an event to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. By that time a few people had begun work: the bridal exhibition had been arranged, lighting the beacon was organised, permission to close roads had been sought, the PRS had been approached regarding any licences we might need and the availability of the band we wanted was checked. Other events under consideration at the time were a disco, a classic car exhibition, a Coronation chicken night in the pub and a sports day for children. The first committee meeting was held in early January and following that a group of around 20 people worked to ensure the various events, would take place. The village owes those 20 or so people a huge thank you for their efforts. I would also like to thank the various people/organisations for their donations, without them we would have had to charge more than we wanted for the different events. NYCC (David Ireton), CDC (Linda Brockbank and Stuart Handley), Burton in Lonsdale PC, Pals with Trowels, the Methodist Church, The Village Shop, Mick and Heather Hill, BiL Heritage Group and Concert & Cakes.

All that remained was to see how successful the four days would be. I was confident that the bridal exhibition, the lighting of the beacon, the Coronation chicken feast, the classic cars and the disco would be well supported and would justify the efforts of the volunteers. What I was not sure about was if the weather would affect the village party in Low Street and the picnic and sports day on the recreation field. Fortunately, the committee's faith in my ability to organise good weather for the two days was well founded. Both days were a success, Dani Sicari and the Easy Rollers were great fun and very entertaining. On the Sunday the picnic and sports day, the easiest and cheapest event of the weekend, was a huge success, probably the 'welly whanging' was the high point of the day, although the children enjoyed their events too. At its final meeting the committee had to decide what to do with the surplus of £1,525.97 the events generated. Several options were considered and other opinions sought. It was agreed that a fund be created, the purpose of which is to provide seed funding for future village events. Such events must also provide a surplus.

During the months of preparation and the Jubilee weekend itself, it was good to see that we didn't have to rely on the same old (in some cases, very old) faces to make things happen. There has been a mix of old and new with roughly half of the 20 people on the committee having lived in Burton for twelve years or less, some for under a year. Whilst this is a healthy sign, it would be good to see still more of the under 45s say, taking a more active rôle in village affairs. Perhaps these Jubilee events will prove to be a catalyst and more young, and very young, people will step forward and take over the running of the village.

# <u>Lonsdale Wheelers</u> - report submitted before the meeting by Lyndon Thomas was read by Cllr Thompson Report to the Annual Parish Meeting – 11<sup>th</sup> May 2023

The club still comprises 3 main groups catering for 3 different options and objectives:

- Longer Ride Group: riding throughout the year on quiet roads at a pace that's enjoyable; no one is left behind. Distances up to c70 miles.
- Shorter Recreation Ride Group: twice a month spring to autumn, at a steadier pace and especially suited to anyone with an E-Bike. Distances typically c20-30 miles.
- Mid-week Group: typically retired or working part-time. Distances typically up to 70 miles.

The longer ride group also organise car assisted away-days and overnight trips to add interest and keep things fresh. The club also participates in local sportives.

Additional club activities in the last 12 months have included:

- 7-day club tour to Mallorca cycling some of the island's classic routes.
- 2 days cycling around the Peak District.
- Away-day to cycle Holme Moss and the South Pennine moors
- Club participation in the West Riding Classic and Cumbrian Cracker sportives.
- Planned 2023 club tour to the Costa Blanca to cycle in the Sierra Mariola in Spain.

Communication and ride coordination is by WhatsApp. The first Sunday of the month is set as the regular ride but there are far more rides organised informally between members on WhatsApp.

Membership remains only £5 per annum; which includes British Cycling club affiliation. The club has also been able to fund first aid courses for 2 members and a donation to the NW Air Ambulance service.

#### <u>Multimedia Shop</u> – report was presented by Simon Willan

My name is Simon Willan and I am the owner of the Multimedia Shop on the High Street Essentially we are a computer repair shop, but we also sell new and used computers.

Because the name Multimedia shop sounds vague, (it dates back to a fad for CD-Rom drives, sound cards and speakers of the early 90s) we are asked to look at all manner of weird and wonderful things. At the moment, I'm in the process of repairing the LED lights on a Lego Ferris wheel and rebuilding a 1950s smoking animatronic bar tender!

We have been in the Village for more than 27 years providing a service to an ever growing number of people from far and wide. Many of whom are people who have lived locally but have moved to places as far away as Australia.

I think we have a rather different approach to the service we provide – I spent the first 18 years of my working life as a nurse so I aim to assess people's needs and work out the best way of meeting them, rather than pushing product.

I believe that users need to understand that there is a difference between a driver and a mechanic – I am a mechanic whereas they are drivers. Also that not knowing something is not the same as stupidity! We always try to educate where appropriate.

#### <u>Pals with Trowels - report given by Marilyn Smith.</u>

It has been a very successful and busy year for the PALS.

The bi-monthly book café has continued to be a very popular and well supported event and is now well established in the village calendar. The November book café saw the introduction of bacon sandwiches onto the menu. This was originally intended to be a one off experiment but proved to be so popular that it was decided to stick with it for the winter months. Together with the usual array of cakes, we ensured that all tastes were catered for.

We were given permission by the PC to source and plant two trees adjacent to the children's playground to replace the two trees that had been removed a couple of years ago. After much deliberation we decided to purchase two flowering cherry trees which were planted last autumn and hope that in the years to come, as they become well established, they will become an attractive addition to this area.

In early Spring last year we successfully applied to the Platinum Jubilee Fund for a grant to enable us to create a wildlife area adjacent to the Orchard. The earlier felling of several trees on safety grounds had exposed an area of woodland that lent itself to such a project, and so the Platinum Jubilee Wildlife area was born. A massive clearance operation was followed by the provision of bird boxes, bat boxes, wildflower planting and the erection of a living willow dome which has proved very popular with younger visitors to the orchard area. At the beginning of the Easter holidays we were joined by children from the village and their families who had great fun building a bug hotel which hopefully will be hosting its first guests by now! Wood piles made from the felled trees have been placed throughout the area to act as habitats for all manner of creepy crawlies and any other wildlife that may care to use them. Of course all this didn't just happen by itself and massive thanks must be given to those volunteers who have given their time, usually Saturday/Sunday mornings to help with all the heavy work that this project generated. We couldn't have done it without you – you know who you are!

Another challenge has been the renovation of the western entrance to the village, following the installation of the B4RN cabinet. In order to make way for this we had to remove two small trees, the bench and the planters surrounding the village sign. Over two weekends at the beginning of May, the community workforce along with some of our members have transformed this area by building a plinth for the newly painted bench and two stone planters either side of the village entrance sign which will be soon be planted up with seasonal blooms, and will provide an attractive welcome to the village for visitors and residents alike. Wherever you look in and around the village you will come across the results of the work continually going on behind the scenes to keep the village looking its best, regardless of the time of year. I would like to personally thank each and every one of our group for their continued hard work and commitment to the village, and to the residents of Burton who support our events in such numbers, enabling us to continue to fund the work we do.

We thank the World War One committee who generously donated the remainder of their funds to us, and have bought a Rollerball Fun House which has been a huge success with the children. The older children chose some new books for our library, and we still have money left over which we will spend next year. Thank you to all our volunteers, families, and All Saints church for their support.

<u>Table tennis group</u> - report submitted before the meeting by Denise O'Hara was read by Cllr Thompson The **Table Tennis Group** continues meet in the village hall on a Tuesday and Thursday mornings. We enjoy some friendly games, never too competitive but always fun, which hopefully keeps our reflexes sharp and provides manageable exercise for ageing limbs! I am pleased to report that the Shop continues to thrive in its role as a principal facility in the Village. Not only does it provide full shopping service for those who want it, and "convenience" shopping for those who want that, it's also a hub, providing a source of community support to every individual and household. We are eternally grateful to our Manager, Sarah Salrein, together with her team of paid staff and, of course, the team of volunteers. Not only do they make the shop do its job effectively, they also provide its friendly and supportive atmosphere, which is valued so much by so many frequent and less frequent customers. During the year we have held a public meeting — at which about 40 people attended and provided input on what they saw as our strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and threats. We have also carried out a customer survey, which has confirmed overwhelming satisfaction with the Shop. These exercises have helpfully identified ways to improve what we are doing.

In particular, I am pleased to confirm that, from 1<sup>st</sup> June, we will be opening until 6pm, on Mondays to Friday.

Also we have placed the order for installation, in the next few weeks, of new doors, and will tomorrow be finalising the order for a new counter and shelving behind it. We will be rearranging the shop display and giving the shop a thorough makeover.

Apart from improving our customers "shopping experience" these changes will give the Shop better financial resilience, going forward. So we can be very confident about the future.
