A Historic day for Burton in Lonsdale

On 4 July 2025, our village successfully completed the purchase of the Punch Bowl which is now safeguarded for all of us, forever. 20 years after the Village Shop came into community ownership, Burton in Lonsdale now joins a very exclusive group of communities which own and manage their own assets. As the original "social network", the Punch Bowl has been part of the historic fabric of the village for 300 years. Now it is ours, we can secure a rich, lively and resilient village community for years to come.



On 5 July, 58 villagers and three dogs braved the rain to raise a glass in celebration. Then, in the first week, we had electrical, kitchen, fire safety, intruder alarm and asbestos surveys done. The cellar was cleared, the licensed premises transfer notice submitted and structural engineers and building contractors were on site. And then the work really got going with rubbish, carpets and wallpaper cleared by a crack Pub Taskforce team of volunteers. Organised over three days by Chris Dolan, 36 volunteers contributed 184 hours, which is the equivalent of one person working 23 eighthour days! Thank you to everyone who came along.



On the day, Co-chair Peter Thompson outlined that a key part of the building's restoration work hinges on obtaining Listed Building Consent.

This is a photo of the staircase behind the bar — not a view many will have seen before. However, the Heritage Conservation Officer was very impressed with this particular feature!







Crime prevention - We Care Scheme

Supporting people with disabilities or those who may be vulnerable for any reason North Yorkshire is one of the safest places to live in the UK. However, for some people, going into their local town or city centre can be intimidating. The We Care scheme looks to provide a sense of safety and independence for those who may be more vulnerable and enables the police to provide them with a better level of service.

What is We Care?

We Care is a North Yorkshire Police scheme designed to support anyone who is vulnerable and needs some help and assistance when they are out and about, or even in their own home.

The scheme has been designed, with the support of York People First, to enable people to go out into their community and live their lives, but at the same time feel a bit safer and secure.

It also provides important information to the police about a scheme member, so if they ever need to dial 999 or 101, the police are aware of any special needs the caller has and can assist them and provide a level of service in line with their requirements.


People of any age can join - so far the youngest is 7, and the oldest is over 100. The scheme is free for any resident of North Yorkshire or York.

A person would find the scheme helpful if they could be described as long term vulnerable for any reason. Many people on the scheme are affected by the following: learning disabilities, physical disabilities, neuro-diversity, dementia, Alzheimer's, sensory impairments, communication issues, mental health, etc.

How does the We Care scheme work? (cont. from p.8)

When applying, a joining pack can be sent directly to the person wanting to join, or to a family member or guardian. The pack contains a 'help me' card, which members of the scheme can carry in their purse or wallet, and use if they ever find themselves in need of any help when out and about.

If the card carrier feels confused or lost – they can present the card to a person, in a shop or to a police officer and request help. The card gives a brief explanation of the We Care scheme and lists contact details for parents, carers, next of kin or friends who can be contacted about the scheme member. NOTES FROM AN UNINTENDED NATURALIST August 2025

The walk I took down a lane off Bentham Moor earlier in July was new to me. The quiet breeze on this midsummer evening was very agreeable and the expanse of moorland habitat changed once I stepped over the shiny cattle grid. I had only my binoculars with me. No phone or camera .

Banks either side of hedgerow, buttressed by low ancient dry stone walling, were interesting enough in themselves —no mechanical and indifferent hedgecutter needed here, to keep the narrow lane passable. I could not see, but could hear the singular sound of a sheep tugging at grass tufts the other side of the hedge. I felt an intimate connection with another sentient being, though it was undoubtedly indifferent to my presence.

Further down the lane, the contours gave way to flatter banks of a paint palette of wildflowers: Heavenly blue meadow cranesbills, bright splashes of yellow loosestrife, a party of pinks and reds rosebay willow herb, dog roses, tiny herb Robert, hedgerow pink cranesbills, red campions, foxgloves with their creamy spotted interiors. I stopped in wonder at these stunning divas, standing four to five foot, on long smooth stems.

Each plant had a large magenta shaving brush, confidently springing out from a neat cross-gartered calyx. I leant forward (after a white tailed bee had moved on), to inhale the sweetest honey scent from the shaving- brush head. I couldn't name these statuesque magenta marvels, but later research, revealed they were Melancholy Thistles. I had heard the name before, but had childishly imagined sorrowful drooping thistly blooms, not these magnificent, but natural, works of art.

Eventually moving down the lane, I was aware of a small flock of lapwing, tumbling, diving making Moebius loops of joy over the fields, until they moved off, out of sight. A tiny dark shape revealed a hare. Light brown, its long velvety ears with black lobes so perfectly still. As I lifted my binoculars, the strong back legs sprang into long leaping action, across and up the sloping field, to a stone wall. Stopped before moving away. Maybe this year's leveret.

Eventually, turning back on myself to the moor, a black and white, handsome moustachioed sparrow -sized bird perched on the stone wall above me . A pied flycatcher. I could see, without my field glasses, the beak crammed full of insects with wings and legs escaping out of the gape. He stood still and was in no hurry to move away. Perhaps taking time before feeding fledglings, I thought.

Then two smudgy yellowy cream fluffy youngsters appeared on his right. There was the tiniest "ts ts" sound, and the adult flew up to a nearby telegraph line and perched. The youngsters followed. One moved nearer the adult, but its body language indicated this was not the time or the place. He moved sideways away on the wire .

The disturbance of the first car in over an hour came down from the moor. And the family of flycatchers were off. The reverie of my evening walk was over. But an hour or two of my life had crossed paths momentarily with those wild lives. Such a privilege.

Bee Keeping at Bull Farm

Honey bees form a significant part of our environment and economy. They act as pollinators for plants and trees, including agricultural crops. However, loss of habitat, importation of disease and use of modern pesticides is endangering this vital resource. Here at Bull Farm, we thought we would help to safeguard the local bee population by establishing a small apiary. The Bull Farm Bees arrived in July 2023 and the following poster explains our approach to bee keeping.








There are over 200 different species of bee in the UK and only one species of honey bee which is native. This is called the European dark bee (Apis mellifera mellifera). Importation of non-native species to the UK has recently led to the introduction of disease and cross-breeding. The bees of Bull Farm were sourced locally, and are thus well suited to coping with the climate of Craven and the Yorkshire Dales.



The European dark bee feeds on pollen and nectar from flowering plants. The pollen is used to feed larvae within the hive, whereas nectar is used as an energy source for the bee and to make honey. The honey is a storage product for the bees to feed on during the winter months. Our hive is sited amongst the hay meadows of Burton in Lonsdale, which are rich in spring flowers, including red clover, white clover, buttercups, common mouse ear, sorrel, meadow cress, oxeye daisies. The foraging season is extended throughout the summer by pollen from the surrounding trees, e.g. Alder, Ash, Beach, Oak. The late season is characterized by flowering autumn fruits including pollen from hedgerow Brambles.



A bee hive is split into two main sections. The brood box is the most important part of the hive. This is where the Queen bee lays eggs to rear larvae and ensure a continuation of the bee population. In this brood box, the honey comb is filled with a mixture of eggs, larvae, honey and pollen. The stores of honey in this part of the hive are essential for ensuring the survival of the bee colony throughout the winter months. Above the brood box is the 'Super', A 'Queen excluder grid' between the two compartments means this section is just filled with honey. This is the honey that can be extracted each year for our consumption.



The honey is extracted in late summer, ensuring sufficient remains in the hive to serve as a food source for the bees during the winter. The frames from the super are removed from the hive and the cells uncapped to reveal the honey within. Each set of frames is spun at high speed using a centrifugal extractor to remove the liquid honey which can then be bottled and enjoyed.

All Saints Church Windows and Open Weekends

Many of you will already have seen the scaffolding around church and various vans and lorries coming and going - struggling badly on the corner by the church! The windows in All Saints were installed in 1870 and have not been touched since. A survey over 2 years ago drew attention to the deterioration and broken windows. The windows are tiny quarries (panes) set in lead and are of antique cathedral type glass.

The prevailing west winds coming up the Lune valley have caused major problems in the west facing windows. The PCC has decided to go ahead with repairs to the worst affected windows - at a cost of over £45,000. Although we do have the funds for this it would pretty much clean out our savings and will affect our ability to carry out other important work - not least to some of the other windows. We are therefore applying for grants to a number of organisations, and would also welcome help or suggestions...In September we are opening the church as part of the National Heritage weeks. The plan is to open church on Harvest Saturday, 13 September - Yorkshire Historic Churches Day and on 19, 20 and 21 September. Posters will be displayed around the village but our plans include opening the newly refurbished Lych Gate where Peter will display his local finds found during his expeditions with his metal detector and the tower will be open for those who wish to see the wonderful views and to explore how the bell ringers work up in that lofty chamber.

The regular visitor to the Old Churchyard ('VOSCY') bordering Chapel Hill will have noticed a different cutting regime. Mown paths now connect all the headstones, just in case anyone wants to visit Burton's former residents, with additional swathes through longer growth – just to make it adventurous. The somewhat untidy patch near the cottages, where it is still hoped to encourage wild flowers, is not working – yet. How-

ever, other parts of the churchyard are full of naturally growing attractive grasses and flowers, which not only look pretty but also, hopefully, encourage wildlife. There are

loads of butterflies up there this year, although it could do with a few more bees and grasshoppers. Who knows, perhaps with global warming, we'll see some snakes and lizards there one day; but possibly not lions, tigers, or bears. Last year, there was a resident hedgehog — but, sadly, s/he is no more; beautiful prickles, though.

Into autumn, the intention is to gradually reduce the areas of

longer growth, with the aim of tidying up the churchyard for winter.

I could do with a bit of help maintaining this lovely spot in the middle of our village for the community - and possibly even improving it. Footfall has certainly grown since it has been looked after more systematically.

And from our Reader, Cathy Rowland Pilgrim musings: So was it....or wasn't it (a Camino?)

From late January this year some of you may have seen me on my daily Camino training walk, pack on back and walking poles in hand, traipsing through Greta woods and up and around in a loop - what a wonderful little local walk we have there!

This was all in preparation for another Camino, this time the Camino Primitivo (the Original Way) from Oviedo in Northern Spain across a stunning mountain range and from there on to Santiago de Compostela. This is a relatively short but physically demanding Camino route. I set off at the end of April feeling as prepared as I ever would be. But then an annoying head cold and cough set in, which I quietly ignored and began walking as planned. Four glorious days of walking- but in which, sadly, the nasty cough only got nastier and my nose streamed like an unstoppable waterfall! And then, on day five I awoke having taking a real turn for the worse and the unwelcome awareness that I had to listen to my body and stop walking until I was well enough to go on. And I felt genuinely grim! My disappointment and frustration were intense! It took over a whole week holed up in the Pilgrim hostel that I'd reached on day four before I felt well enough to leave, having, in the meantime, had to completely revise my plans for the rest of the trip. My walking Camino had had, of necessity, to become a 'bus Camino'!!

But it was also still a reflective Camino. When you walk alone for hours every day on the Camino the mind and spirit are in glorious freefall, wandering here there and everywhere between the wonder-filled ordinary and the mysteriously sublime. And holed up in my little cabin bunk I was still able to go on a 'reflective Camino' as I attempted to process all my intense emotions and the unpleasant experience of feeling 'not myself'.

To walk a Camino is to take conscious time out to go deeper into what it means to be human and for those of us with faith in a loving Divine presence in our lives, time to delve more deeply into that whole transcendent realm. So my challenge this time was not to push myself physically day after day as I had been expecting to do, but instead to surrender my frustrated, annoyed, temperamental will to God and the situation and just accept the all-too-obvious reality of my illness, trusting that this loving Divine Presence was just as much there with me as if I'd been walking (and maybe more so!) - and would get me through...

Subsequently several beautiful and totally unexpected things happened (but there's no room to talk about them here!) which allowed me to quite genuinely say that I had had an amazing time on my 'Camino'. It wasn't the Camino I had been expecting...but it was the Camino I was given! Despite myself, I was led deeper into the experience of human disappointment, frustration and unpleasant physical illness...and I know, in so doing, that my understanding of God at work in my life and what it means to be human and vulnerable has also gone deeper.

So to answer the obvious question people have asked me "Will you finish it off next year?" the answer is "I don't yet know". Things have a strange habit of becoming apparent when you try and keep an open heart and mind to a loving God...at least that is my experience!
