


planters, one either side of the Burton in Lonsdale sign with stone donated by Jane & Lloyd in the village and filled with plants by the Pals with Trowels.



## Parish Council News – Peter Thompson, Chair Parish Council Meeting 18 May 2023

There were two meetings on 18 May. The first was the annual Parish Council meeting in which the roles of chair and vice chair were nominated for the year ahead. Peter Thompson agreed to serve a further term as chair. Billie Strickland agreed to continue as vice chair. The meeting also reviewed the committee structure and membership. The council will continue with 3 committees - planning, finance and recreation fields. The draft minutes will be posted on the village website and the Parish Council notice board. Details of committee membership will also be posted on the Burton in Lonsdale website.

The second meeting was the regular full Parish Council meeting, chaired by Peter Thompson. Matters discussed included an update on various contact with NYCC on road safety, notice of planned discussions between the Parish Council the Parochial Church Council and plans to initiate more thorough maintenance work in the very old and separate churchyard (known more commonly as the VOSCY). The chair confirmed NYCC is still in the process of reviewing the planning application for proposed holiday lodges adjacent to the River Greta. The draft of these minutes will be posted on the village website and Parish Council notice board.

Six members of the public attended the meetings.

#### **Lemon Cheese Cake Ice Cream** - Alessandra Toft

This recipe is incredibly simple and quick to make. It's great for the summer, and most important, it's very tasty. The ice cream part of the recipe you can very simply adapt to create your favourite ice cream flavour, all without needing an ice ream maker or endless whisking whilst the ice cream freezes.

All the ingredients can be purchased from the village shop, (very convenient for us, and of course it helps to support the shop - so a win win.

I have created a lemon cheese cake dessert for you to make and enjoy which uses this simple ice cream recipe, which is made with only two key ingredients.

The ice cream, by itself can be made in minutes, and is great to have in the freezer.

To make vanilla - flavoured ice cream, simply omit the lemon juice and zest.

If you are feeling creative play around with adding various additions, such as fudge pieces, chocolate buttons, fresh strawberries, meringue pieces, swirls of lemon curd, an espresso shot, Oreo biscuits broken up, just let your imagination flow and have fun!

#### **Ingredients**

#### Ice cream

300 mls	double cream
300 11113	adable cream

198 g Nestle condensed milk (half a tin)

5 mls vanilla extract

zest of two lemons

60 mls l lemon juice, (or to taste and how lemony you like the flavour to be).

Base

50 g s shortcake biscuits crushed

60 g melted (preferably unsalted butter )and a little extra for greasing

#### **Toppings** Here are a few options

- 1 Fresh raspberries arranged on top of the cheesecake
- 2 Frozen summer fruits, defrosted and drained then add sugar to taste, and spoon over the cheesecake before serving.
- 3 Summer fruit coulis, defrost some frozen summer fruits or berries, and put in a pan and gently warm and add sugar to taste, then pass through a sieve, and transfer the coulis into a small jug. When ready to serve cut a slice of cheesecake, place on a plate and drizzle the coulis over it. Decorate with mint leaves if you have any.
- 4 Crumble over a chocolate flake, or simply grate your favourite chocolate.

**You will need an** 8 - inch loose bottomed cake tin, (or 8 - inch quiche plate).

It can be nice for a special occasion to use individual ramekin dishes (If you line them with cling film before filling, it helps to make turning the mini cheesecake out very easy)

#### Method

To make the biscuit base, gently heat the butter in a pan until

it's melted, then add the crushed biscuits and mix well and put into the greased cake tin or quiche plate and using the back of a spoon press the biscuit crumbs down to create a base and then place in the fridge to harden.



To make the ice cream, whisk the double cream, in a bowl, till it just starts to form very soft, and still floppy, peaks. No further, do not over whisk! Add the condensed milk to the whisked cream, with the lemon zest, the lemon juice, and vanilla extract. Gently fold everything together.

Once the biscuit base has set, spoon the ice cream mix over it and use a spoon to level it out. Now put it in the freezer. Once frozen, cover it well with a double layer of foil and keep it in the freezer until required.

Before serving, remove the foil, allow 20 minutes for the dessert to soften and simply add the topping of your choice.

If you decide simply to make the ice cream, then, once made, pour into a container which has a good fitting lid and freeze.

**Dear Editors** 

**Burton Communication Group** 

I wonder how many people know of the existence of the BCG or what its purpose is? If you've never heard of us that tells you how good we are at communicating. Let me tell you something about the Group and explain what a vital rôle we play in the life of the village.

The BCG was established in 2004 and the first issue of *the Burtonian* appeared in April of that year. The founding members were Sue Gregory, Marion Hodgson, David Gibson and Tomoko Alderson. Their purpose was to produce a newsletter containing information about forthcoming events and some reporting of past events. The newsletter would be paid for by advertising and would be delivered to every house in the village. An editor was recruited as were the first five distributors. It was soon decided that the newsletter would be published every two months. Some things don't change. Leigh Marshal produced one issue then In October 2011 Phil James took over the editorial reins followed by David Taylor who joined forces with Marilyn Smith to become joint editors in April 2016. In June 2022 the current editors, David and Cecile Gillibrand began their stewardship.

Over time the Group has taken on responsibility for the Village Website. The Website is now looking a bit dated and so the committee are exploring how best to improve it. One of the problems we have is that there are two months between each issue of *The Burtonian* so if anything of importance happens between issues we have to rely on posters or word of mouth to spread the word. (*By the way did you know that In 2022, the Burton in Lonsdale Waste Water Treatment Plant sewer storm overflow spilled 157 times for a total of 271 hours, or about 11 days non-stop.) To enable us to keep you properly informed about local events and issues we shall shortly be asking you for your email address. Of course this is voluntary and we have to comply with data protection rules first. The current committee is Paul Adams, Janet Coulthurst, Cecile Gillibrand, David Gillibrand, Julie Gabriel-Clarke, Marilyn Smith, David Taylor and Mike Lavelle. #### Settle Pool acts to tackle soaring costs


At a time when swimming pools across the country are facing soaring costs, Settle's community pool has reluctantly had to increase swim prices as part of a series of measures to ensure the pool stays afloat financially.

From May the price of an adult swim is £6.20 with reductions for the over 60s, full-time students and children. The full list of new prices is on the pool website at <a href="https://www.settleswimmingpool.co.uk/swimming/prices/">https://www.settleswimmingpool.co.uk/swimming/prices/</a>.

Over the past few months the pool has faced a series of price hikes. Gas bills have risen four fold from £1,000 a month to more than £4,000 – even with government support. Insurance premiums have gone up drastically and like everyone else the pool is facing double digit inflation on a range of costs.

In other measures to keep costs down the pool is looking to add to the bank of solar panels installed last year: these have already helped keep down the electricity bill. It has undertaken a detailed review of measures to cut its carbon footprint and as a result is looking to increase insulation in the older part of the building. Perhaps most significantly it is looking at the possibility of following the example of a pool in Exmouth that has teamed up with the Deep Green company and installed a 'digital boiler' that transforms the heat generated by a bank of computer servers into hot water for use in the pool.

One great advantage that the Settle pool continues to enjoy over local authority pools is the support of many volunteers who help run the charity shop in the centre of Settle and its associated on-line sales.

# CONCERT & CAKES

This year, in September, Concert&Cakes will be 10 years old!

The first concert was held in September 2013 and was a tribute to Burton in Lonsdale resident Chris Rowland. An internationally renowned violinist and chamber musician, Chris established the Chamber Music Department at the Royal Northern College of Music and it is the heritage of those groups he coached that we enjoy today at All Saints Church.

The structure of offering free concerts in return for donations is based on a similar successful concert series at Emmanuel Church in Manchester and we are committed to making sure that ours are accessible and open to as many people as possible.

Concert&Cakes is run by myself organising the music and the publicity, Steve Vose managing the finances and Cathy Rowland organising the cakes. In the last year, we returned to our usual pattern of four concerts, in October, November, February and March. After a break of 2 years during the Covid-19 pandemic, October and November had a smaller audience than we used to have, but February and March seemed to be back to strength with between 100 and 120 at each.

And now for some statistics. In the last ten years we have

Held 35 concerts

Hosted 136 musicians

Playing around 23 different instruments

Enjoyed an estimated 490 cakes!!

We have 90 names on our email list and estimate the cumulative audience over the last 10 years to be around 3,500 (some people coming more than once of course!)

And as for the musicians, well

Caroline Pether from the first ensemble we had, the Zelkova String Quartet, is now leader of Manchester Camerata

Dani Sicari and the Easy Rollers, who entertained us at the Village Jubilee party last year have just completed a Spring tour

Delia Stevens of Kabantu is now senior lecturer in percussion at Leeds conservatoire alongside a string of performing credits and broadcasting and

Abel Selaocoe of Project Jam Sandwich has been signed as a solo artist on Warner Classics, released his first album last September, featured on Later ... with Jools Holland and has just returned from his first US tour.

I'd like to finish with a message from Cathy, which was originally intended to be published in The Burtonian:

"Christine, Steve and myself never cease to be amazed at the number of people who come up to us and tell us how much they enjoy the event, which is a joy for us to hear and makes all the preparatory work worthwhile, even though it is the musicians, bakers and helpers who graciously bring it all to life on the day!

#### We talk to Burton 'Man of Action', Andy Ive

When we first arrived in Burton, you were the first person we met. You were on the Green, wrestling with a table football machine. What was that about?

All Saints Church had kindly agreed that the table football could be set up in the Village Hall. I am the Chair of the Hall Committee – and I ended up moving it (with some difficulty). I am afraid it's still not being used.



But you actually go to Church in Ingleton. How did that start?

My wife Ruth and I moved to Ingleton, in 1988, with our two children, Corrina and Jannicke, and we've been going to St Mary's (where I am a Church Warden) ever since. Even after we moved to Burton in 2004.

Why did you move to Ingleton, in the first place?

Apart from anything, it is in the heart of the best potholing in the Country. I started caving when I was just 12. I have been underground in caves all over the World. I specialise in cave- diving. I was involved in a 1985 BBC Production, 'Diving Caves of Marble', (sadly long before i-Player or Youtube). I no longer go underground, but I'm still involved with Cave Rescue Organisation as their Equipment Officer.

Your kids have long since flown the nest but your House, Fairfield is big. Don't you rattle around?

Certainly not! For about 28 years, Ruth and I have been fostering children. You'll have met Sarah, out and about in her wheelchair. She suffers from Cerebral palsy. She's been with us for 13 years, coming home, to us from her School. We regularly fostered two more boys Alex and Kierin who left our formal care but they became like sons and Kierin recently 'boomeranged' back home to us.

And we now need space for our four grandchildren, to come and stay! A real pleasure.

#### How did you meet Ruth?

At a caving weekend in South Wales in 1976. We married in Southwark Cathedral in 1980





(Ruth worked at Guys Hospital), and moved to Norway to work for a few years, me offshore and Ruth as a nurse.

#### Did you enjoy your career as an environmental engineer?

Of course. Apart from anything, I have been able to work all over the World. I was in Norway (on and off) for 8 years, then Bangladesh, then Russia (minus 55 degrees some nights!), then the Sahara in Algeria (plus 55 degrees!!) as well as Holland, Denmark, Kazakhstan, Northern Iraq (until we were thrown out by ISIS), Libya (until the civil war made that "no-go") – and many others.

Some of that actually sounds pretty tough. Is there a place you like to dream about? Yes. I had a job, for 3 months, as a diving instructor on the Great Barrier Reef. In 1986 Ruth and I wanted to go round the world and we set off with Corrina and Jannicke (then aged three and one). We drove to Egypt in our VW, left it there and flew on to South Africa, Kenya, Seychelles, India, Sri Lanka, South East Asia, before that magical time in Australia. Then Tahiti for a month, then by car from Los Angeles to Miami. We came back home with the children 1 ½ years older — and the subject of a book I wrote, 'Kids in Tow'. Would you like to borrow it? I'd like that, thanks!

#### How did you get this travel bug?

It started when I was 8 years old. My parents took me, by ship, to Nigeria. My father was Minister of Finance in the Post Office. I remember it so well. We had a great time.

#### What do you specially look forward to?

I have a passion for folk music. In the '60's and '70's we used to go to a youth hostel in Surrey (Tanners Hatch) – and developed a great crowd of friends (the 'Rentacrowd'), who now include children and grandchildren. We see a lot of them all. We meet every New Year as well as several weekends – and those gatherings, with the Music, are a real treat.

Thanks Andy. You weren't so well as few months ago, but we're glad you have made a full recovery, leading the Village hall Committee with their important development plans as well as performing at the monthly Music Nights in the Pub.

#### JMW Turner, Burton in Lonsdale and the Swiss artist Christine Wardle

When Swiss artist Monika Mueller came to stay in 2021 at Teena Taylor's Loft at Tatham Lodge, we learned the incredible story of her "Ways of Turner" project and how the artist JMW Turner came through Burton in Lonsdale on his tour of the North in 1816. First introduced to Turner's paintings of Switzerland, contemporary artist Monika found Leeds Professor David Hill, author of "In Turner's Footsteps" which documents Turner's 1816 sketching tour of Northern England. Turner never completed the commission, so this was the starting point for Monica's own "Ways of Turner" Project. She has now

finished three visits to the area and painted 120 views – in her own style after Turner – and so completed his original commission.

The first set of paintings were exhibited in Lucerne in November 2021 with a sketch of the route from Ingleton to Kirkby Lonsdale showing Burton in Lonsdale on the wall of the gallery!



Monica will be back in the UK this summer, staying with friends in Ravenstonedale and showing them some of the places on this tour. She will then be exhibiting the full project in Lucerne in May 2024 at the same time as launching the project book. If possible, she will hold a book launch at Turner's House in Twickenham and again in Cumbria later next year.


