### ***Dear Editors***

I would like to draw attention to a problem that seems to be occurring more frequently involving cars parking on Chapel Hill close to the junction with Low Street and Leeming Lane. Cars coming down Chapel Hill, and especially those turning into Leeming Lane, need to be able to see down the hill to check if cars are coming up. Cars parked close to the junction preclude this and if you are turning into Leeming Lane you sometimes have to do it blind and hope that anyone coming up the hill is complying with the 20 mph speed limit and will be able to slow down further. Since most of us on Leeming Lane use it one way to avoid coming out onto the hill, for similar reasons coming the other way from The Green is not an option, nor is turning in the lane easy enough to make coming and going via The Green an attractive alternative.

I sympathise with anyone trying to find a car parking space close to their house in Burton but I am concerned that I and mine or others may be involved in an accident. I have spoken to Andy McClurg and understand that he agrees there is an issue. However, North Yorks. CC are unlikely to put down double yellow lines. Enforcement of limits on parking on all junctions would only push cars around the village. May I therefore ask residents to be aware and to think twice before parking close to this particular junction.

After 18 months of closure and last minute snags the refurbished and the UV filtered Hornby swimming pool opened to the general public on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> September.

Just in time for the new school year and already attracting a great deal of enthusiastic support and impressive visitor numbers.

*'Superb, fabulous, welcoming - a great family pool, the freshwater quality is fantastic'. etc. -* just some of the comments to date! Don't take our word for it, come and see for yourself.

The new pool management team of Chris and Scott are looking forward to meeting you all.

A seven day timetable and pricing is available at the pool and updated on the website, as new sessions are added, along with all other details. New bookings are flooding in and we welcome suggestions for any sessions from 'learn to swim- all ages; specialist training, fitness sessions to social and family parties' Lots of new ideas - just let us have your thoughts.

Apart from improved visitor numbers we still need to raise funds to cover the exceptional leakage repair costs and loss of revenues prior to re-opening. The unique 'Tag a Tile' promotion -which was launched at the Hornby Sheep show in Wray - garnered almost £600 over the open weekend. It is available to all Lune Valley residents and means that you can identify with your pool by 'tagging' a tile in your name, family members and/or friends. The £1.00 Tile sponsorship Certificates can be purchased at the pool.

But of course the main funding source is the Stakeholder Pledge without which we would not have been able to transfer ownership to the community. We shall shortly be calling in this vital financial support and If you are still thinking about it please let us know and we can explain the stakeholder pledge option.

Thank you all again for your generosity , patience, understanding and dedicated voluntary work without which none of this would have been possible. Of course it's still early days and sadly, like all rural facilities ; pubs, shops, cafes, post offices, buses etc., the golden rule has to be 'Use it or lose it'

It's been a gruelling few months for all of us but together we've done it - we are back in business!

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## A MATTER OF PERSPECTIVE

The job of editing *The Burtonian* is not particularly onerous but it does consume about four/five days of David's and Marilyn's time every couple of months, all voluntary. As I did the job for a number of years I know what is involved, proof reading, formatting advertisements, liaising with correspondents, juggling the contributions to ensure they fit and making certain that the finished article looks presentable, then getting it printed and distributed are just some of the tasks involved. It has never been part of the brief to censor submissions. I was somewhat saddened therefore to hear that one article in the last issue which was obviously written in light-hearted vein should cause the editors to be the subject of some censure. The fact that the article was written under a pseudonym caused almost as much distress as the content itself.

Why this sudden reaction to one article? For the last thirteen years or so, on a fairly regular basis, it has been the objective of the Local Affairs Correspondent, the Environment Correspondent, the Rural Affairs Correspondent, the Apolitical Correspondent and the Fashion Editor et al to bring a little light-hearted humour to the pages of *The Burtonian*.

Accepting that a sense of humour is a personal thing and not everyone sees comedy in the same things, introducing an amusing element helps to differentiate *The Burtonian* from most other village magazines and I know that these articles have raised a smile or two over the years. Indeed, a number of people have even been kind enough to remark on the wit of some of these pieces, the April Fools in particular.

As to the noms de plume, I believe they add something to the humour, I don't believe the authors have been afraid to hide their names. On a personal note I have never felt the need to conceal my identity when it comes to concerns affecting the future of the village, as those who have attended Parish Council meetings and other public meetings concerning issues such as the closure of the school, the possible community purchase of the Punch Bowl, the possible closure of the shop and additional village housing can testify. For many years, through these pages and elsewhere, I have made my views known on the importance of village institutions, the Churches, the shop, the village hall and the pub. Without these vital elements all we are left with is a collection of houses. We failed to save the school, largely due to our own indifference.

The point I am trying to make is that I am not aware of the same intensity and vigour being applied to important village issues as was applied to this frivolous article. For instance, also appearing in the last issue of *The Burtonian* was an article asking for new members for the Burton Village Shop Association and another asking for volunteers for the WW1 Centenary Concert – I hope these articles generated as much interest, support and enthusiasm as the trivial nonsense about footwear, but somehow I doubt it.

There are great opportunities to expand the support that we provide, but the funds of the charity are limited. The trustees, all committed local people, have in recent years set up various fundraising activities. The best known of these are the Christmas concert held in late November and the annual quiz night held in June. Both have now become annual fixtures in Bentham's social calendar.

## Burton-in-Lonsdale WI Report August/September 2018

Our guest in August was Jean Argles from Hornby speaking about her time in the FANYs, or the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry. This organisation was considered to be 'the finishing school for espionage' - women at war. Jean told us the circumstances which led to her joining the FANYs. This organisation and its uniform is the oldest of the Women's Services, starting after the Boer War when trained nurses were needed in the field. Jean wished to contribute to the war effort when her older sister Pat joined the WRENS. As her father, Colonel Cary Owtram, had been taken prisoner in the Far East, her mother refused to let Jean join up, but she became a cypher officer. She told us that her interviewers were looking for people with a spark and ability to work independently.

She told us about her first posting, leaving England on the Atlantic Convoy with no idea where her destination lay, although she and her group were told to pack for a warm climate. She remembered sailing through the straits of Gibraltar, seeing lights on the African coast and total darkness on the European side. Arriving in Alexandria (Sue and Rick's best guess, as Jean couldn't remember!) and her suitcase missing, she quickly adapted to life in Cairo, where there was no rationing in force. Later she travelled to Italy via Benghazi and Malta, being allowed to sit at the controls of the RAF plane and making the unsuspecting passengers very sick. One of the things she remembered best was the beautiful almond blossom around Bari. It transpired that Brian Woolnough had been stationed there. She reminisced about the Opera House and performances of Madame Butterfly, meeting Tito who was accompanied by an enormous dog, and travelling to Florence from Rome in a truck which was carrying corpses. She said it felt like being on holiday, although there were no tourists and she and her friend could hear gunfire. During her time she dealt with agents, but it felt like being part of a forgotten army in the Mediterranean because the main theatre of war had moved to North-west Europe.

When her father was released from the Camps on the Burma Railway he came home by sea. He had been Camp Commandant and by superb diplomacy had helped to ensure the survival of many of the prisoners. At great risk to himself he recorded events in detail, and eventually Jean and her sister pushed for his memoirs to be published: '1000 Days on the River Kwai'.

Jean summed up by saying she had a very adventurous time but had had to grow up very quickly.

Margaret Owen gave the vote of thanks, echoing Jean's early comment about her exploits seeming like a magic carpet ride not only for her at the time but also for the captivated audience.

In September, 4 members had a thoroughly enjoyable outing to Lowther Park where the restoration works and new garden developments were much admired. For the evening meeting, Heather had been able to persuade the owners of the 1657 Chocolate House, Kendal to come and talk to us about the history of the building, chocolate making and then give a chocolate tasting session, which proved very popular judging from the queue to buy products afterwards. Joan and Gavin have decided to stop their informative talks, so we were very lucky to secure them for their last engagement. It was good to have a large audience for their visit. Margaret Gibson gave the vote of thanks.

Jill, Sue, Carolyn and Mary went to the Group Fun Night at Low Bentham and managed to acquit themselves by coming a respectable third in the quiz. There are several Burton entries for the Ingleborough Group WI Show at the Community Centre on October 6<sup>th</sup>. Future events booked include the Autumn meeting at Coniston Cold, Christmas at Harewood and a Christmas Show at Gargrave. Some members who have been rehearsing with the Federation Rock Choir will be performing at Ripon Cathedral in December.

The October meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> in the Village Hall at 7.30pm will be a demonstration of paper-making and sale of related items.

The programme for monthly meetings in 2019 is now complete and we would love to welcome new members, our regular visitors and anyone else who is interested to join us.

**Pride of Preston, The Dick, Kerr Ladies 1917-1965**

Forget Barcelona, author Gail Newsham claims that the Dick, Kerr Ladies is the most successful football team in the world. Formed by munitions workers in Preston in 1917, the team has quite a story to tell. Come and listen to Gail, the team's official biographer, tell it. ### **Tuesday 6 November – evening**

Showing in the Village Hall, the film **THE WIPERS TIMES**. Based on the play by Ian Hislop and Nick Newman, it tells the often hilarious story of the satirical newspaper established by remarkable soldiers who discovered an abandoned printing press in the front line. ## GARDEN WITH GUNTHER

"What a man needs in gardening is a cast iron back with a hinge in it"

(Charles Dudley Warner 1829-1900). 118 years later, it still applies.



A huge push by the Pals (plus some kind helpers, you know who you are) to get the orchard area ready for grass seeding was made over three evenings in early September. One particular weed "Butterbur" seemed to be laughing at us, the more we dug and attacked it, the more it seemed to flourish but at last all was ready. A day of light rain followed the grass sowing which gave it a perfect start. We hope to get damson trees planted this autumn also the donation of a cherry tree has been promised. At the time of writing the orchard has started greening up....watch this space.

Once again David Thornber, our horticultural hero, gives advice on what we should be doing in October/November.

### OCTOBER -

Lift dahlia tubers to store dry over the winter months. Remove bulbs and dying back foliage prior to storing them.

If summer containers are past their best, re-plant them with fresh winter bedding. Also this is a good month to start planting spring bulbs such as daffodils and tulips.

Now is a good time to move and re-position shrubs and small trees. Also to clear up fallen leaves from roses to prevent fungal disease such as blackspot over-wintering.

After weeding and tidying the borders, mulch with bark chips or well rotted compost to insulate plant roots for winter and keep weed growth in check.

Divide congested clumps of rhubarb by digging up and splitting into several pieces with a spade and re-plant the healthiest crowns.

Wrap grease bands around the trunks of apple trees to trap winter moth females whose caterpillars can shred the spring blossom.

If your greenhouse is fairly empty, now is a good time to clean and sterilise it with disinfectant. Also clear away fallen leaves from the lawn to allow maximum light to the grass. Keep it looking neat and tidy by continuing to trim the edges.

### NOVEMBER-

Early this month you can continue to plant spring flowering bulbs for a great start to next year's display.

Place orders for bare root roses now as they can be planted any time from now until March. Also you can prune pear and apple trees this month and any time before mid-February.

Tidy up fallen leaves and debris that can provide a hiding place for slugs and snails and also remove any of this material from ponds.

Empty and clean out water butts and do not allow them to be full of rainwater as a hard winter frost can expand the water resulting possibly in the container cracking and leaking.

Also disconnect hosepipes and put away.

Protect any slightly tender plants growing in an exposed location with some horticultural fleece if frosts are in the forecast.

Cut down canes of autumn fruiting raspberries right back to ground level. Clean your lawn mower before putting it away for winter and if it is a petrol machine, drain off the fuel.

### **Community Led Housing project**

We know that the high price of housing in our area means that many young people have to leave the village in order to find an affordable place to live. If we are to keep Burton alive as a vibrant community we need to attract and retain young people by providing houses they can afford to buy or rent.

A public meeting was held on 14 August to consider how the Richard Thornton School site could be used to meet this need. It was very well attended, with about 80 villagers present. At the end of the meeting a unanimous show of hands was in favour of a project to provide affordable housing for the long-term benefit of the village.

One of the speakers, Emily Grogan, the Rural Housing Enabler for Craven District, explained that there are various options for accessing funds so we should not worry about how it can be financed. These sources require us to conduct a housing needs survey in the early phase of the project as part of an application for funding.

Architect James Newton talked about other Community Led Housing schemes he is helping and he showed some initial design ideas of what we could achieve.

It is vital to get as complete a picture as possible of the village's thoughts as to how this project should proceed. We have therefore prepared a Housing Needs Survey questionnaire, which is included in this month's Burtonian. It should be completed by anyone looking for housing, who wants to help run the project or even has an objection to the whole idea. You do not need to live in the village. We also need responses from people who do not live here at present, but want to live in Burton. If you know anyone like that, please ask them to contact [ianrt2003@hotmail.com](mailto:ianrt2003@hotmail.com).

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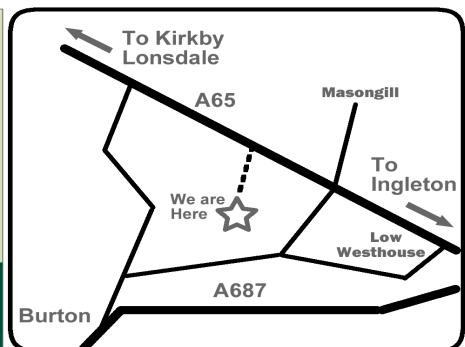

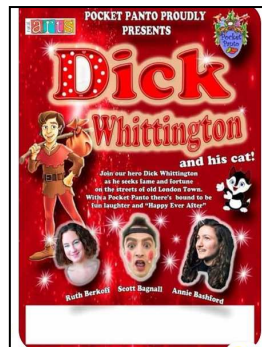

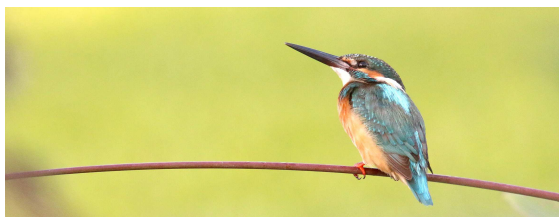

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## **Craven and the First World War Project**

## And from Vicar Denis ...

It was the Village Cricket match. I ran in to bowl. The ball pitched, moved off the seam, clipped the outside edge of the bat and was safely caught by the wicketkeeper. Well that was how it was supposed to happen. In reality the batsman swung the bat and the ball disappeared into the trees. Somewhat surprised I tried again (once the ball was found!). Unfortunately exactly the same happened again. I couldn't understand it. I looked the part. I was in immaculate cricket whites and I had once bowled for Lancaster. Inside of me I felt the same as I had done then. The inside of me was clearly a different age to the outside of me! It was worse when fielding. Getting off the ground after stopping the ball seemed to take an age. I reflected that it was an age since I had last played-upward of 20 years.

However, although growing old has its issues it's usually better than not growing old. In a few weeks we will be involved in Remembrance services, especially significant in this the 100<sup>th</sup> year since the end of the First World War. Part of the service will include the lines from Binyon's poem 'For the Fallen' -

***"They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old:  
Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.  
At the going down of the sun and in the morning,  
We will remember them".***

Could I ask that you support the various activities that will be taking place in the village in the days around the Remembrance Weekend? That we do remember those that age will not weary and their compatriots who did survive conflicts but remain in need of aid for the injuries they sustained.

In this context we should not resent growing old for some were denied that privilege but to see that the measure of a life is not its duration but its donation.

For those that age does weary these are the words of God as recorded by the prophet Isaiah "Listen to me....even to your old age, I will be the same, and I will bear you up when you turn grey. I have made you and I will carry you, I will sustain you and deliver you".

Last thought perhaps I could be an umpire next year!
