Community libraries look to the future. Volunteers from the county's community libraries met to celebrate their success and share ideas at the annual library conference.

The County Council's Executive has approved a permit scheme to improve control and management of work across the county's roads.

Digital Minister Matt Hancock MP spent two days in North Yorkshire seeing the benefits of our pioneering superfast broadband work.

The Fostering North Yorkshire team has said a big thanks to a couple for 32 years of caring for some of the county's young people.

We're encouraging people to find out about community organisations by using a new online directory, North Yorkshire Connect.

The next step towards addressing congestion in and around Harrogate and Knaresborough will be taken next month.

Our road safety team has recruited some new members in response to concerns about irresponsible parking near school entrances.

UK Youth Parliament, including North Yorkshire members, is to focus on lowering the voting age to 16 and a curriculum for life in 2018.

We are renewing our call on the government to give long-term fairer funding to large rural counties like North Yorkshire following this year's financial settlement.

We are working with mobile phone operators EE, O2, Vodafone and 3 to improve coverage as part of our ambitions for economic growth.

North Yorkshire libraries now have more than 400 BBC micro:bits (pocket-sized codeable computers) available for children to borrow to help to improve their digital skills.

We are consulting on a series of proposals that change our school transport policy for those students with special educational needs or disabilities.

North Yorkshire Health and Wellbeing Board is inviting comments on its draft pharmaceutical needs assessment, which looks at pharmacy services in the county.

People who were given electrical items such as mobiles or laptops for Christmas can recycle old ones at household waste recycling centres in North Yorkshire.

Our Adult Learning and Skills Service offers more than 900 part-time courses, including accounting, business administration, computing, supporting teaching, English, maths, health and social care.



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

Another fundraiser has taken the baton on - and I am happy to take on any in the village that people have on their envelopes and send them on to her. There is still a huge area of interest in philately in the world and prices can be good for unusual stamps.

About a centimetre of envelope is needed around the stamp - if you haven't the time or will to do this, I am happy to sort and trim. The basic rate is £6 a kilo with more for picture stamps and £13 for a kilo of used foreign stamps. And unusual ones get sorted to raise even more.

There is so much to recycle but this actually yields a profit for such a worthy cause.

I have put a little box in our wonderful village shop which I am happy to regularly empty and sort.

I hope this won't be my only contribution to village life but its a start!

Happy New Year to everyone and welcome back to a Spring 2018 season of Concert&Cakes.

We have two concerts to look forward to.



On **Saturday 17th February**, we welcome the fabulous Chameleon Wind Quintet. People quite often ask how we choose these ensembles and are always amazed at how good they are. Well, the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester is world-famous for its chamber music department, so that's a good start. Throughout the year, students are encouraged to form duos, trios, quartets, quintets and sometimes larger performing groups to play with lots of different combinations of instruments and across musical genres. Then there are competitions in the Autumn and Spring, selecting the best of each genre. This culminates in an annual 'best of the best' Award evening, the Chris Rowland International Chamber Music Ensemble of the Year Award, which pitches brass quartet against String trio, and everything in between. This is judged by an external expert, as well as by the RNCM Head of Chamber Music. There is always one winner and the audience get to pick their favourite too. So these are the ensembles we start with, and always hope to be able to get the winners of the award – this year it was the Huoguo/Loukos String Quartet, who we heard last November.

So many people were completely blown away by last November's concert, we didn't think we could do better. But this year you can be your own judges. Chameleon won the audience prize in 2017 and we think they are fabulous! They push the boundaries of typical wind ensembles, and experiment with new combinations of wind instruments. They are based on a traditional wind quintet, replacing French Horn with Saxophone, and each member is principally one of the other four instruments - Flute, Oboe, Clarinet and Bassoon.

The next is on **Saturday 17th March** when we will be treated to our first guitar concert with the award-winning Sam Rodwell and his trio. Look out for the posters around the village and if you'd like more information, sign up to the mailing list on concertandcakes@outlook.com.

As ever, all Concert&Cakes concerts are from 2.30pm to 4.30pm at All Saints Church. If there is any chance you could help, please get in touch with Cathy Rowland. We look forward to seeing you there.

Progress report on the village projects

There has been quite a lot of activity on the projects which Tau Solar agreed to fund so it is time to give everyone an update.

Pals with Trowels have started to plant the community orchard beside the river. Many thanks to those who helped prepare the ground. Much more work to do when the weather improves so it is not too late if you want to help!

The village shop has two new freezers which will be more energy efficient and provide more storage for frozen food.

The sports pavilion is still expecting its solar panels to arrive any day but there has been a delay in delivery due to high world wide demand for panels. We are chasing the supplier as they have already been paid by Tau Solar.

Tau Solar has also paid for replacement wall panels around the hard court at the recreation ground. Burton Community Sports will install them when it warms up a bit.

The old swing frames have been removed from the children's playground and by the time you read this the new ones should have been installed (assuming there isn't a sudden up-swing in world-wide demand!)

We will soon order equipment for an outdoor gym and to extend the age range supported at the children's playground. More on this soon.

Many thanks to the village organisations who have dug into their reserves and to the individuals who have been applying for additional grants to add to the £30,000 from Tau Solar. You can expect the total spent to be quite a bit higher by the time all these efforts are successful.

Bentham Moor Road

Although the new footpath from the bridge means that we no longer need to walk along the road, a number of parents have commented about the speed of vehicles going past the main gate to the recreation ground.

The police community safety program "95 Alive" arranged for speed monitoring equipment to be installed in the 30mph zone in November/December. The speed of every vehicle was recorded 24 hours a day for a week (no photos were taken).

The average speed recorded was 33mph. This means that half of us must have been travelling faster and in fact 15% exceeded 39mph.

If you drive past the recreation ground please be aware that there may be children crossing. Even if you obey the 30mph speed limit this is fast enough to kill. The police have promised to conduct speed checks so please keep your speed down.

As part of our 100 year commemoration of the end of WW1 we will be participating in the national chain of beacons as we did for the Queen's Jubilee celebration.

Our bonfire will be lit at 7pm on Sunday 11 November 2018.



CRAVEN COMMUNITY CHAMPIONS AWARDS

The awards ceremony took place on Thursday 11th January 2018 at Coniston Hotel. The different categories are sponsored by local organisations and businesses based in Craven. Each finalist makes a video presentation which is shown at the awards ceremony. It's a tense moment for all the finalists and although judging took place in November the outcome is a closely guarded secret, so no one knows who the winners are, until the final moment!

Nominations don't open until the Autumn giving plenty of time to keep an eye open for that special individual or organisation that deserves recognition.

NEW WEBSITE FOR CRAVEN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Craven District Council has launched a new website on January 9, 2018, to provide better online services for residents, businesses and visitors.

The website has been designed to make it easier for residents to find information, pay bills and report any issues.

The new website platform will save the council money – approximately £10,000 over the next five years.

The site will be more mobile-friendly, and a new feature called "My Account" will be rolled out meaning that residents can log on to the website and view any transactions they have had with the council.

Recycling bring sites to be removed across Craven

Craven District Council's Policy Committee has agreed to remove all its remaining recycling 'bring sites' across Craven except for one in Embsay.

Most sites were removed at the end of 2016 after concerns that they were being abused by businesses who were using them to dispose of commercial waste.

A consultation also found more than 95 per cent of respondents would use alternative recycling services such as the household recycling services, other recycling centres, or charity shops, if their local bring site was closed.

Six bring sites were retained, at Grasmere Close car park, High Bentham, Main Street car park, Embsay, Glusburn Institute car park, Glusburn, Whitefriars car park, Settle, Community Centre car park, Ingleton, and Coach Street car park, Skipton.

However, the council has monitored the remaining sites and found that they are still being used by businesses who then avoid paying for commercial waste disposal.

Wyn Ashton, Environmental Services & Housing Manager at Craven District Council, said: "All our residents have the opportunity to use our doorstep recycling service since the extension of kerbside collections of glass, plastic, cans, paper and card to all properties in Craven in February 2010. "Businesses should be paying for their own collection and disposal of waste and recycling. However it is clear that a number of businesses continue to abuse these bring sites, meaning that the council has to spend tax-payers' money on extra collections at the sites.

"Some residents are also using the sites to dispose of residual household waste, and electrical and electronic equipment, which should be disposed of at Household Waste Recycling Centres."

The proposals are to remove all bring sites from the district from January 20, 2018, with the exception of Embsay.

Notices will be placed at all bring sites warning residents of the removal date, and alternative methods of disposing of recycling and waste. The closed sites will be monitored to deal with any fly-tipping issues that may arise.

Digital Advantage offers grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 to cover 40% of the consultancy costs associated with identifying and improving the digital capacity of a business. The grants can be used to support a range of improvements such as:

- * Photo and video content creation
- * Mobile optimisation;
- * Creating a bespoke digital marketing strategy;
- * Designing a new telephony system

Available across the whole of the Craven, the scheme is managed by 'CU Scarborough' part of Coventry University.
