The Village Shop

At the end of 2021, I wrote an article concerning the future of our Village Shop describing plans to improve its look and service to the village, to help secure its future. In progressing that ambition, we have submitted a planning application to alter the front by moving and widening the shop's door and we are working with a shopfitter preparing a detailed costed design for the interior.

With budgets now squeezed and competition from big supermarket deliveries everywhere, none of us should take the Shop for granted. Its long-term sustainability relies on us all using it more. It's an important source of high quality locally-supplied goods and services (with the Post Office), a social hub and, not least, a local employer in its own right. We also have a dedicated band of volunteers who work hard in various capacities, to offer a great service for Burton. It certainly showed its worth throughout the pandemic.

In planning this refurbishment, the Management Committee have made the assumption that the village needs, will use, and will support the Shop in the long term. It would be reckless for us to undertake such a project without village support. There are ways we can show support for our Shop and its refurbishment. First, we need more of us to visit regularly, see what's available and use it. Why not consider taking at least 3 items off your weekly supermarket shop, and purchasing them from us? We have an astonishing range of products at competitive prices, including value brands and promotional deals, which compare favourably even with the big supermarkets. We work with local suppliers to negotiate high-quality items at great prices and we can source specific goods for you, just speak to one of the team.

Solar panel plan for Settle pool roof

Work on the redevelopment of Settle Swimming Pool, which serves this part of the Dales, is continuing apace with a replacement roof going up following the damage caused by Storm Arwen late last year.

The aim is to re-open both the pool and the newly developed additional facilities towards the end of the summer. The new building will include modernised and family-friendly changing facilities, a multi-use dry area and new catering facilities.

One advantage of the replacing the old roof is that it is now possible to add solar panels to the building.

A substantial fund-raising exercise is currently underway to meet these additional costs. As well as individual contributions a big fund-raising effort was made through pool supporters participation in the Skipton Rotary dragonboat regatta held on May 15 at Coniston Hall lake, with a crew including pool users from this area.

In other pool news the charity shop in Duke Street Settle marked its fifth anniversary on the early May bank holiday. During the past five years the shop and associated on line sales have raised more than £275,000 for the pool. This steady income has helped pave the way for the new development now taking place. Donations of goods for sale in the shop can be made at the containers in the pool carpark each Tuesday and Friday morning between 9.30am and 12.30pm.

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
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BURTON PARISH COUNCIL

The *Burtonian's* roving reporter couldn't get to last week's Parish Council meeting, but we hear it was well attended with lots of good discussion.

From the Agenda, we can say that there was a discussion about the problems with the Bank and not being able to appoint new signatories; a report on the audit of the annual accounts; thoughts on the land parcels being offered just outside the village; and discussion of local planning applications. In particular the future application about "pods" or "houses" by the river (see article in this issue of the *Burtonian*).

The draft Minutes of the meeting will be on the website by the time you are reading this (or soon after), do have a look and perhaps come to the next meeting to have your say.

The **BURTON COMMUNICATION GROUP** held it's AGM on the 21st April, in the Punchbowl

Due to Covid there had been no meeting since 2019.

The Treasurer, Paul Adams, presented the accounts for the past two years, which indicated a healthy bank balance of £3860.00. Income from advertisers (£1300) together with the sale of The Burtonian at the shop for non residents (£30) meant that the Burtonian almost broke even on an annual basis. However, the cost of printing the Burtonian was set to rise by 15%.

In light of the increase in costs it was proposed and agreed that the cost of the Burtonian to non residents be raised from 25p to 50p.

The BCG receives £100 each year from the Parish Council to pay for the village website and it was proposed that the committee request this be raised to £130.

A discussion followed regarding the possibility of cutting back on printing costs by producing some pages in black and white.

As you will read elsewhere, the editors informed the meeting that after a lot of thought they have decided to stand down.

It was decided to purchase a bottle of wine each for Sue Gregory, who retired as secretary recently and to Simon Willan, who provided a printing service at very reasonable rates and stood down a couple of editions ago.

A vote of thanks was proposed to them both for their contributions.

The meeting continued with a very constructive discussion about the viability of the Burtonian, of which more elsewhere in this issue.

Janet Coulthurst (recently moved into the village) came to the meeting, her expertise is in Marketing and Communication and she will be able to offer help in investigating ways of improving communication within the village.

The meeting closed at 21.30.



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Gardening with Gunther



June and July 2022

In the summer months we all enjoy being out in the fresh air, enjoying our gardens and the green spaces that surround us. If you fancy taking things a step further in June why not sign up for the Wildlife Trusts '30 Day Wild' campaign. From little actions (like stopping to smell a flower) to bigger things (like giving up single use plastics for a week), 30 Days Wild is all about doing something wild, connecting with the natural world and doing a little bit to help wildlife.

More info can be found at www.wildlifetrusts.org/30dayswild...but in the meantime here's some jobs for the coming months.

June

In the greenhouse keep the atmosphere moist to avoid red spider mite.

Move tender plants outside for the summer.

Divide and repot auriculas in gritty soil-based compost.

Cut back early flowering herbaceous plants to 5cm from the ground to encourage fresh growth.

Prune established cherry, almond and plum trees.

Thin crowded apples and pears, leaving well positioned fruit to mature.

Sow some zinnias outside for late colourful blooms.

Plant out Brussels sprouts, other winter brassicas and leeks.

Don't forget the Pals with Trowels plant stall at the village Hall on June 11th.

July

Liquid feed plants in containers.

Keep deadheading flowers to encourage more blooms.

Feed sweet peas fortnightly with a high potash feed.

Combat slugs with natural controls, coffee grounds are good but not if you have cats or dogs as they are toxic, try copper bands instead. (Decaf is not effective!)

Trim evergreen hedges eg holly, yew and conifers.

Take cuttings of silver-leaved herbs.

Net crops to protect them from bird attack.

OUR RIVER VALLEY IS UNDER THREAT

The Greta valley which runs west of the village is a very special and unspoilt area but it is now under potential threat. Agents for a developer have put in a preliminary screening application to Craven for a proposal to build 8 two story luxury holiday lodges on the northern bank of the river close to the village (one third of a mile from the church as the crow flies).

The site for this proposed development is unspoilt pasture and ancient woodland and has been designated in the Craven Local Plan as a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC). When walking through Greta Wood and the field beyond, these lodges would be highly visible from across the river and would alter the rural feel of the footpath.

A planning application has not yet been made and will have to be accompanied by a full Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA); the developer has not yet consulted or informed the village about the proposed development.

B4RN4Bil CONTRACTOR DIG SCHEDULED FOR LATE SUMMER 2022

Contractors are scheduled to build the majority of the B4RN4BiL network in the late summer. Before then we, as a community, need to finalise the routes, decide where on the boundary of each property the B4RN service should be terminated by the contractor, (including properties that currently don't require the B4RN service) and for each household that has requested B4RN, dig in ducting from the boundary to the property itself and install a House Kit.

To help our community we need to form a Community Workforce who is tasked with digging in ducting and installing House Kits to all household that need our assistance.

Unbelievable numbers

From our environment correspondent

When I were a lad, living on a brand new council estate in Blackpool, there were an elderly couple living next door but one. They were in their fifties so that were quite old back then. We lived about 300 yards (metres they call 'em now) from Preston New Road. This couple had a strange idea for a night out. On a Saturday after their tea they'd get dressed up and walk up to Preston New Road where the road had a grass verge and on the verge were a bench. For two hours they'd sit there watching the cars go by. Course there weren't as many cars as there were in, say, the late 1960s except during September and October when the lights (Blackpool illuminations) were on. Then, in 1975, the M55 opened, this would have completely ruined Saturday nights out for my neighbours if they'd still been alive. However, this started a new interest for me. While many of my mates went train spotting, collecting train numbers in special books. I thought 'I'll be different', car number plates were the thing for me. Not the actual number plates, we only had a small house, but the registration numbers were what fascinated me. I would spend hours writing the numbers down in my little black books. I would take some of my books to school to show to my mates. It was normal to see FR and FV registrations, they were the Blackpool registrations. I remember going to school one day and could hardly wait to tell them I'd seen a Scottish number plate on a Humber Hawk. How exiting, but they would often be anxious to get home to watch 'Crackerjack' on tele. But my interest progressed. Now, just look around the village for personalised number plates. Aren't they interesting? I must confess to not really understanding some of them. Spending hundreds of pounds to put a name or some initials on a number plate obviously has a purpose especially as we get older. With increasing age it can become more difficult to remember things, in particular people's names and especially your own. So how useful to be able to look outside your door and see your number plate and know it has some significance, if only you knew what it was. Then there are the number plates which their owners must find amusing for some reason. They fork out hard earned cash for things like BOSS or HOG. Do they really look at these and smile every time they go out Does anyone else find them funny. I am now certain that every time I see a private number plate somewhere in the background there's a personality disorder.

NOTES FROM AN UNINTENDED NATURALIST MAY/JUNE 2022

It is a beautiful Spring morning in mid May. The cold gusty wind from yesterday has passed and the air is clear with the promise of sunshine later today.

Out before 7.30 on an early walk to Edith Wood, I notice an owl pellet near to an old barn. I will not forget seeing one meticulously dissected in Ynys Hir Nature Reserve not far from Aberystwyth many years ago and put in a frame for inspection. The carefully laid out 32 tiny bones were from very small mammals—shrews and mice that the owl had taken.

As I enter the wood, now in full leaf after the long winter, a cock blackbird is singing a melodious improvisation of melodies high up on a branch above. His head is lifted high and golden beak parted for maximum aural effect. I listen for several minutes. How glorious this music is. The focus of the blackbird of course is not to entertain me of course but to woo a female. If she is listening ,she will certainly be impressed.

The cock thrush, (in the same classification as blackbirds) that sang his song from the top of a neighbouring tree earlier this month, was an early evening joy to hear. I recorded one on a mini disc many years ago and the memory of that links me to the present. The recital, I recall , lasted for twenty minutes before pausing.

The dawn chorus as the Spring birdsong in Britain is so affectionately called is a joy to hear –but is not a chorus as such. Each bird call is particular to each bird in its song of courtship. The backdrop "chorus" may be made up of warning calls that a predator is about. Human or animal. Or the focused drumming as this morning of a distant woodpecker to get insect breakfast from the treebark. As well as the individual songs of courtship.

A clear cooing is echoed by more muted calls from pigeons further off in the broadleaf wood. A neighbour of mine says the sounds always remind him of Northern France. Now a male chaffinch alights on a slender branch before me-then silently flies off. Other small birds are making themselves heard and the sylvan magic of the wood is working its enchantment on me. In a clearing beyond the modest tinkling brook lies a carpet of Silverweed. This plant with its serrated leaves, fernlike in appearance reflect the sunlight to appear to be made of silver foil. An uncelebrated ubiquitous plant of verges but so beautiful. I have loved it since childhood, the lovely yellow flowers will come in June.

Another bird heralds from his part of the woodland. A different singer. I listen and see this warbler is a male blackcap. A well –named bird. His distinctive black feathered beret is a strong contrast to his paler greyish body .The female has a brown cap. But it is the male I hear singing this morning. I did once have a pair coming to my birdfeeders in Lancaster in Spring.

I am loathe to leave the wood; the distant rumble of a plane, hum of traffic, of human machinery takes over from the world of birdsong.

The owl pellet is still on the path and a brief pleasant exchange of greeting with a man and his dog.

As I return home for breakfast, I think of the 14th century Welsh poet, Dafydd ap

Gwilym. I think the memory of the bird sanctuary at Ynys Hir near Mavchynlleth made me think of this wonderful poet whose poetry is so based in the lovely area of mid Wales I know so well and still has ancient woodland left that he would have known. I quote the opening to the poem "The Woodland Mass" I put his original Welsh words on the right because they are so beautiful heard aloud. As an ENGLYN should be.

I was in a happy place today, Under mantles of lovely green hazels, Listening, at dawn of day To the ingenious cock Thrush Singing a polished ENGLYN With portents and bright lessons Lle digrif y bum heddiw
Dan fentyll y gwrddgyll gwiw
Yn gwarando ddechrau dydd
y ceiliog bronfraith celfydd
yn canu englyn alathr
Arwyddion a llithion llathr.



The accompanying sketch was made after I found a beautiful young thrush which had fatally crashed into a large glass window.

I put bird silhouettes on the window to avoid future disasters after this distress.
