News From Bentham Medical Practice – June 10th 2021 Minutes -Summary

Jonathan reported that vaccinations are tailing off slightly and Morecambe Bay Trust reports there have been 225,000 1^{st} vaccinations and 165,000 2^{nd} vaccinations and invites have gone out to the 25 – 40 year olds.

At the RLI last week there were 7 in hospital ward beds and this week there are 3. Only 1 now in intensive care and last week there were 2. There has been 3 discharges this week and 4 the previous week.

The Morecambe Bay Hospital Trust has put out a new helpline for hospital appointments. The new line is for current patients waiting for an appointment and they can ring the number if they want to discuss cancellations or reassurance on when they are going to be seen. The new number is **01539 716998** and you select option 2 or you can email <u>patientchoice@mbht.nhs.uk</u>

The changes proposed to Lancashire and Morecambe Bay is currently very vague and there is very little information out there. Generally the services will stay the same so Bentham practice will have patient s with services from Lancashire and North Yorkshire. The ultimate goal is that all our health services will be provided by the same organisation that provides these services to the South Lakes area but that will not be happening for at least 12 months. Lorraine confirmed that all the meetings she has had with the CCG and MBHT are definitely up in the air. Apparently it appears to be exclusively a paper exercise at present. In the surgery all contact with nurses is now face to face and this is increasing with doctors as well. The extended access service is now running with every 3rd Saturday held at Bentham. It is an expensive service to run so we need to fill as many of those appointments as we can or we could lose it. We need to advertise this service and posters will be placed around the area and hopefully we can advertise in the local magazines/newsletters. Another service called the Community Pharmacist Consultation Service is just getting off the ground and through that the patient can call the practice and they are asked a number of questions and then it can be decided whether they need to see a doctor or they could speak to the community pharmacist.

The practice is spending a lot of time on the Primary Care Network but Bentham patients will see a benefit in the coming years. The purpose of the PCN is to get a better relationship and provision of services between the 3 local practices – Bentham, Sedbergh and Lunesdale. There is a lot of pressure and support from NHS England for the PCN.

There have been some staff changes over the last few months with Janet Dobson (reception/admin) leaving and Leila and Louise starting. Two ST3 (final year before becoming a GP) have left and one or two more will start before August. We have also employed 2 more occasional locum doctors.

Kennel Cough in Dogs

Kennel cough is caused by various viruses and bacteria which causes inflammation of the throat, lungs and airways. The illness also presents itself with a persistent, hacking cough that resembles the sound of choking.

Kennel cough is highly contagious and is spread via contact with another infected animal or by inhaling/ ingesting secretions from an infected dose nose or mouth. E.g. sneeze/ cough, food bowl/toys. Incubation period can be from 2 days to 2 weeks. **Symptoms:**

Mild

- Dry, persistent, hacking cough
- Retching and gagging
- Runny nose
- Eye discharge

Sneezing

Severe

- Loss of appetite
- Listlessness
- Fever
- Pussy discharge from the nose
- Chesty cough that produces phlegm

While highly contagious the illness, in most cases, is not serious and symptoms will improve on its own within a few weeks. There are exceptions to this, however, and owners of elderly dogs, puppies and dogs with underlying health issues should monitor the condition closely as it can develop into pneumonia.

There's no specific test to diagnose kennel cough, but a vet can define the illness from the symptoms shown. In most cases no medication is prescribed for Kennel cough.. **Harriet**

To my Friends and Neighbours (and even those as yet unknown to me who live beyond the boundaries of our fair village....),

This is advance notice of an exhibition of my 'Contemplative Craft Art' work (some for sale) to be held in Pye Cottage on the 9-14 October 2021 from 10am - 4pm (Sat/Sun) and 10-12am (Mon-Thurs) - assuming the ongoing virus situation allows it. My background is in Art, Craft and Languages and since moving to Burton thirteen years ago I have had the luxury of being able to focus on Art and Craft activities fulltime, whilst interweaving them with playing enjoyably with language in its many forms. I call my work 'Contemplative Craft Art' as it can be anything from drawings, paintings (mainly oil), design projects and photography... to poems and prose articles... to hand spun, hand woven and hand knitted items...to contemporary patchwork items...and even edible 'artisan' goodies...all produced as the fruit of ongoing thought, prayer and contemplation. The extensive renovation of the Pye Cottage and its garden over the last 13 years has also been an integral part of my ever-changing 'making'. I occasionally sell work as I did a few years ago at Farfield Mill to raise money for the Garden of Remembrance in the All Saints Churchvard, but my work is not done primarily for sale. It happens in order to express things I cannot express in any other way and which, at times, demand to be externalised as best I can. I love (mostly!) the dynamic of change that is invisibly and constantly happening all around me, changing me personally and challenging me to respond. That is why I am calling the exhibition 'MUTABILIS' which is a Latin word meaning 'changeable'. I also have a lovely rose of the same name!

The exhibition (apart from the hope that it will raise a bit of money for two good causes – see below) is to invite you to share in what my sometimes whimsical creative musings have given birth to over the years - especially work done since coming to live here in Burton-in-Lonsdale. I hope it will spark possibilities in those of you who come and even if my creative 'voice' is not at all to your taste, I hope it will stir you into exploring more deeply your own unique 'voice' and that you will be left all the richer for that exploring...

Now to the money bit.....The uncomfortable discovery recently of an area of wet rot in All Saints Church spire has given rise to a flurry of ideas about how to raise money to help get rid of it as urgently as possible.... As I was pondering my own "What can I do to help?" question I decided that my contribution could be the MUTABILIS Exhibition, offering some of my more recent work for exhibition with some of it for sale. So I will be turning the ground floor of my cottage into a temporary gallery space between the 9 -14 October 2021. There will also be home-made refreshments available.

I have also supported for a long time a charity called Ethiopiaid which supports local charities throughout Ethiopia including the vitally important Fistula Clinic for girls in Addis Ababa (if you don't know what this tragic condition is look it up!!!).

Entry to the **MUTABILIS** exhibition will be free but free-will donations will be gratefully

received and any money raised will be divided between these two points of need. There will also be some high quality craft items available for sale....whatever my work this summer yields as a harvest...

And from Vicar Denis

Who was that masked man? To the strains of the William Tell Overture the Lone Ranger would ride off into the distance with the call Hi Ho Silver and away. I was never sure how much of a disguise the mask was. Surely you could see who was behind it. However when the actor Clayton Moore asked for a rise he was replaced by another actor because the director maintained that no-one could recognise the actor anyway.

We have all become familiar with mask wearing. I have tried wearing home-made ones but have fallen back on the generic ones because I find that I can breathe better with them. There have been times when I have struggled to recognise a person wearing a mask. They have become litter in some places but in general wearing one can be seen as caring for one's neighbour. Now if what we read in the media is to be believed, they are to become optional but that could change. I was recently in a church meeting and the question was asked if mask wearing was optional would they continue to wear them. Whilst there was a substantial majority in favour of retaining them, largely on grounds of caution, there were also strong feelings that we should get back to 'normal' and ditch the mask. Undoubtedly the debate will be driven by the national picture.

Despite wearing a mask the Lone Ranger was, of course, a 'goodie'. He frequently had to explain or show this because appearance could suggest otherwise. Appearance is frequently not a guide to what a person is like. God had to guide the prophet Samuel in the choice of a king for Israel. He declared "The Lord does not look at the things mankind looks at. You look at outward appearance but the Lord looks at the heart". Indeed he knows the secrets of our hearts, including our concerns and fears even if we tend to hide them from others as if behind a mask. His presence is always with us and we look to Him for help and support. In the book of Isaiah God declares: "Do not fear for I am with you, do not be dismayed for I am your God. I will strengthen and help you. I will uphold you".




Village Harvest & Produce Show.

Parish Council Meeting 22nd July 2021

This is a report on the regular bi-monthly meeting of the Parish Council. It is not meant to be a complete record of everything discussed, for that please see the Minutes when they are published on the Village website (or attend the meeting!).

The meeting was held in the Village Hall and was attended by the Clerk, five parish councillors and six members of the public.

Kath Salrein.

Before the main part of the meeting there was a discussion about Kath who has been a Parish Councillor for 40 years. She has not been able to attend meetings for some time and had now resigned her position.

Councillors were disappointed about this but accepted its inevitability and there was a brief discussion about marking her long service and retirement in some way.

Item 3 (public questions).

- The first question was about the long delay in planning in respect of the houses at the former school site. And what provision would be made about waste water from the site. Also about the state of the site with the ongoing works to the school buildings. Councillors agreed to press Craven DC planning department which was said to be in disarray.
- There was also a question about the condition of the Lych Gate. It was agreed that this would be professionally inspected, at the Council's expense.
- Finally, there was a request from the Bowling Club to take an electrical feed from the Pavilion for lighting and for power to 'make a brew'. Costs would be paid by the Bowling Club. This was agreed.

Item 4 (planning matters). There was nothing new to report, see the Agenda.

Item 6 (Recreation Field Committee). Three items of interest under this heading.

1. There is a proposal to build a storage extension to the Pavilion.

2. It is also proposed to install fencing to the childrens play area, some 15 metres, to prevent children running into the carpark. It was agreed that this would be sourced in recycled plastic as it was maintenance-free and a "good thing" in spite of being more expensive.

3. Ongoing discussion about drainage around the MUGA (multi use games area).

Item 8 (Queens's Jubilee 2022). A request had been made to the new owners of the Motte & Bailey to allow a beacon to be lit on the occasion of the Jubilee. It was explained that members of the village would be able to climb the mound.

Item 10 (Future Meetings). There will be a special meeting in August, followed by the usual bi-monthly meeting in September. These will be listed in the *Burtonian*, if notified in time, and on the Village website calendar and are open to all.

Gardening with Gunther August/September 2021



August is the last official month of summer in the gardening calendar and a time of great fertility: bumper crops to harvest, beautiful flowers to enjoy and, sadly, plenty of weeds to deal with!

The weather has been kind to us lately and we need to remember to take time out to enjoy the fruits of our labour; the fragrances, sounds and colours that surround us – all the better appreciated with a glass of something chilled in hand of course! Alas! We can't rest on our laurels as there are lots of jobs to do in the coming months, both to prolong the current season and to prepare for the next.

AUGUST

Trim back lavender hard to maintain shape

Keep an eye out for blackspot on roses and treat appropriately, deadheading to prolong flowering

Water daily and feed containers twice a week

- Cut back any lateral shoots of wisteria to 5 or 6 leaves. This controls the size and encourages flowering
- Take cuttings of tender perennials such as fuchsias and pelargoniums to propagate free plants for next year

Keep on top of weeds

SEPTEMBER

NOTES FROM AN UNINTENDED NATURALIST

The consequences of the long spells of hot dry weather are not kind to all. This afternoon I just found an adult browny, grey-green toad on my garden step absolutely still in the baking sunshine. It just had not the energy to hop up the steps to the safety of shade and for its own sake, I scooped it up in a manila envelope and took it to a dark damper area of the garden....

In the short journey there was enough movement in the paper tent to know that it would be alright...a few minutes more and I think it would have been too late. Earlier this summer I found a completely mummified frog in perfect frog -crouching stance when gardening and did not want to be responsible for the demise of another amphibian . I did not waste the latter experience and was able to study the structure of this charred creature and make sketches. Frogs and toads belong to the order Anura and although frogs tend to be more agile, it was the first time I found a live toad so stranded so close to my back door.

Some years ago I was working on Walney Island; a long narrow area connected to Barrowin –Furness by an articulated roadbridge that temporarily made Walney a true island. Vickerstown had been developed for the working force earlier in the 20th century and the names of the streets were to commemorate the battleships that had been Barrow's pride. These names reflected the aggressive stance of early World War 1. I imagined it would be rather depressing to see Powerful Street, Dominion Street and Vengeance Street and more on a rainy grey day on Walney but to a newcomer, as myself, interesting nevertheless. If I mis-stimed my journeys I would have to turn the engine off from my green Morris Minor at the factory whistle sound and wait. Eventually the gates were unleashed by a stone-faced janitor and my first experience of being surrounded by 17 grey workers in their dark overalls ,on their bicycles was a memorable one. I recall feeling as if I had a surreal part of Coketown in Charles Dickens' novel "Hard Times." Friday afternoon was to be a long one ;all the teenage lads that wouldn't get the top jobs at Vickers in Barrow and their pre-ordained status made a few of them emboldened to make fun of the new Art teacher from London.

David ,happier out ferreting , as I later found out, rather than sitting at a desk, and also worthy of a minor part in the Dickens' novel, handed me a quivering little creature that he had in his pocket.

The natterjack toad is a squeaky-voiced attractive little amphibian and as I had never before seen one, but had read about it, was brought to me by the barely literate 15 year old, hoping,I think, for a squeamish reaction to liven up the afternoon.

Instead ,a trusted pupil was given the task of taking the forced émigré immediately back to the shoreline in a clean paint palette with a few damp stones which peregrination I watched from the window with a rather disappointed class who , however, soon bucked up to the possibility of working with clay the following week . If a few rules and boundaries were followed. Hopefully some also took in the conservation ideas I floated across to them of living in a special habitat that they had special guardianship over. I will spare the memories of early days working in clay with these lads but there was some real progression in skills and though David was not going to make a potter, Id say he enjoyed the experience.

My rescued toad this afternoon was Bufo bufo, and had likely been born in the tickertape – like long black and pearly strings of toad spawn which wound around pond vegetation in a nearby garden pond earlier in Spring.

Hopefully this amphibian will have many more days of toadlife ahead.


