# Village Projects

After Tau Solar offered Burton up to £30,000 to spend on the community, the Parish Council called for project ideas and a number of village groups made suggestions, many of which had been mentioned when the Parish Plan Group surveyed residents in 2014.

Some of the projects are still in progress, but we can already see the benefits of most of them. The footpath to the recreation ground is being well used and now leads to the new swings and climbing frame at the children's playground. Half way along the path, the community orchard is developing nicely with the fruit trees in leaf and two picnic benches installed. Across the road, the outdoor gym is in use most days and rebound boards around the all weather pitch are being replaced. On the roof of the pavilion the solar panels are producing electricity which is reducing the cost of heating the pavilion. Up at the community shop the new freezers are providing reliable storage of frozen foods at an improved energy rating.

All this has been made possible not only by Tau Solar, but also by a number of village groups contributing their own funds or making grant applications.





# **Bentham honours VC recipients**

Saturday 21 April 2018 saw the dedication service of the memorial paving stones for two Victoria Cross recipients from WW1 associated with Bentham.

Born in Bentham, Charles Robertson VC MM was a Lance Corporal in the Royal Fusiliers. He repelled an enemy attack at Polderhoek Chateau, Belgium remaining at his post with no reinforcements. He bravely defended his position despite being badly wounded.

The Headmaster of Bentham Grammar School, the Revd. Theodore Bayley Hardy VC DSO MC was a chaplain with the Lincolnshire Regiment. Under heavy shell and mortar fire, he managed to rescue several wounded men. He displayed great gallantry with disregard to his own personal safety.

The stones were dedicated in a service attended by representatives of the Royal Fusiliers and the Army Chaplaincy Corps, who laid wreaths in remembrance of these brave men, and members of the Skipton Branch of the British Legion. The service, arranged by Bentham Town Council and Bentham Churches Together, was led by Revd Anne Russell and accompanied by music from the Kirkby Lonsdale Brass Band. # GARDEN WITH GUNTHER

Many people have commented on how lovely the village looked during April with daffodils everywhere particularly the planting approaching Burton and on the village green. A low point in May was some oik driving a stolen quad bike into one of the village signs, flattening it. We do hope he didn't hurt himself. The



plan is to get it restored as soon as possible.

Work on the Orchard continues apace. New fencing has been erected to ensure safety from the road and sturdy picnic benches bought and assembled for your future enjoyment. Our regular weekend battles with weeds and roots will prepare the ground for suitable grass seed to be sown along with a wild flower mix. We plan to have a naming ceremony in the autumn. It will be called Brenda's Orchard in fond memory of our Pal Brenda Lavelle who would have loved to see this project unfold.

David Thornber "Gardener to the Gentry" has again provided tips for June and July.

# June:

Plant out remaining summer bedding that did not go out at the end of May.

Divide snowdrop clumps as these bulbs are best moved in the green (in leaf).

Have irrigation in place, water butts, hosepipes, etc to keep newly planted specimens watered while they establish.

Give lawns a summer feed. Check roses for blackspot and greenfly and treat as required.

Tidy up daffodil foliage when it has gone yellow as slugs and snails can harbour underneath in the damp conditions.

Earth up potato plants to encourage more tubers to form and stop some going green. Stake and tie up tomatoes and pinch out any side shoots that are beginning to form.

Clip box topiary/hedges whilst growing. Keep on top of weed control not letting annual weeds such as bittercress and shepherds purse go to seed.

Support and tie in clematis and honeysuckle as the new growth can be quite

brittle and easily damaged if there is a windy spell of weather.

Think about netting over soft fruit plants to protect your crop from the birds.

# July:

Remove any blanket weed from ponds as this can spread very quickly in warm conditions and choke out ornamental aquatic plants.

Dead head roses and continue to check for pest and disease. Water pots, hanging baskets etc at dusk for best use and effect of the water.

Cut back faded perennials to encourage fresh new growth. Summer prune wisterias now by removing the whippy new growths to about 20cm from the main stems. Deadhead sweet peas to prolong flowering and remove unwanted tendrils – they can use up a lot of the plant's energy.

Mulch any plants that are flagging during hot spells as this will conserve moisture around the

root system.

Train cucumber stems upwards on canes.

Do not harvest all the rhubarb stems, leave some to help build up the crowns for next year.

# **Recycling Information (Part I)**

Waste: there's a lot of it about!! A lot of it can be recycled from your doorstep, using the blue bin collection. After doorstep collection the materials go all over the north of England to specialised materials processors for processing.

Craven District currently (2018) recycles the list of items below. They're collected every two weeks. Make sure your bin is placed outside your property or at your designated collection point by 6.30am on the day of collection. The devil is in the detail, as they say.



Plastics can be a bit complicated - look for the recycling logo (usually a triangle of three arrows with a number in it) – more in the next issue about these. As a rule, plastic bottles and

Glass	everything, EXCEPT pottery/ceramics, window glass, light bulbs, Pyrex and spectacles
Cans	All food/drink, biscuit and sweetie can and tins. <b>NO</b> aluminium foil, crisp packets, pots, pans, paint tins, cutlery
Aerosols	only household aerosols, emptied of contents, and remove caps
Plastic Bot- tles (Types 1 & 2 only)	e.g. containers for milk, pop/drink, shampoo and hair conditioners, washing up liquid, fabric conditioner. Logo has a 1 or 2 in it. You can also put bottle tops in the bin – take off the bottle before putting in the bin. Don't put in margarine tubs, yoghurt pots, ready meal trays, plastic carrier bags, plastic film, plant pots, vending cups
Cartons	(Food and Drink Liquids) soups, milk & drinks only – wash & squash before putting in the bin
Paper	Newspapers, magazines, brochures, junk mail, envelopes ( <b>not</b> window envelopes, wrapping paper ( <b>not</b> foil/holographic) office/writing paper
Cardboard	cardboard packaging, food packaging e.g. cereal boxes, food sleeves, egg boxes, paper roll inserts, greetings cards.
Telephone Directories	white, yellow, catalogues. <b>No</b> hardback books/directories, window envelopes, wallpaper, Jiffy bags (mixed materials), normal household waste

The final act of the Parish Planning Team was to donate its surplus funds of £443.31 to the Parish Council to contribute toward the cost of the permanent beacon brazier the Council had previously committed to buying for the village, to be used for the commemoration of the centenary of the Armistice of the First World War on 11<sup>th</sup> November as well as for other community or national events in the future.

# **Community Led Housing**

In the Craven District Local Plan now submitted for approval, our former primary school has been allocated as a site for new housing. What sort of housing will we see there ?

We can either sit back and wait to see what a developer chooses to build or alternatively we can take the initiative and decide ourselves, by taking advantage of a scheme called Community Led Housing.

A small group has been set up to put together a proposal for discussion at a public meeting later this year.

We want to address two housing problems – the high price of housing in Burton which prevents young families from living here and the design of traditional cottages which no longer meet the needs of residents as they become less agile.

We believe that we could build 2 and 3 bedroom family homes on the playing field and convert the school building to provide single person apartments all of which would be highly insulated and therefore with low heating costs.

We have engaged an architect to draft a design for the site to meet these housing needs. If you think there are more important problems to solve, please contact Ian Thompson as soon as possible. Even better, would you like to help us design the proposed scheme ?

If the public meeting supports taking this idea further, we would then set up a separate legal entity such as a Community Land Trust to finalise the design and manage its delivery. The CLT would be another opportunity for you to participate if you are willing.
